Tragic Career of the Wife of George tne Fourth of England.

Toward the end of the thirties reat many dovecotes were fluttered by the publication of a diary which had been kept by Lady Charlotte Bury, one of the greatest beauties of Bury penned, but time has obliterated waiting to the unhappy wife of George

Lady Charlotte was the daughter of at 17 years old, when presented at 1 court to George III. and his queen, asonished London by her beautiful face and handsome presence. Like many another spoiled beauty, she did not nake a brilliant match. "Handsome Jack Campbell" was a "great fellow," with only a small income.
