## THIRTEEN HORSES CREMATED IN A DISASTROUS L

Jephson, an Englishman Employed by McAdams & Ferguson, Lost His Life in an Early Morning Blaze.

THE LOSS ESTIMATED AT \$30,000 CAUSE OF THE BLAZE A MYSTERY

The Rex Cigar Factory, Which Is Adjacent, Was Badly Damaged -Firemen Did Good Work in Preventing Spread of Flames.

THE FIRE IN DETAIL. Dead.-John Jephson, an Englishman; home unknown. Location.—McAdam & Ferguson's livery, Dundas street, near

Loss.—McAdam & Ferguson, \$15,000; Rex Cigar Company, formerly Jos. Smith's, estimated \$10,000. Other damage by smoke, \$5,000. Total loss, \$30,000.

Time.—2:05 a.m. Cause.-Unknown

Thirteen horses suffocated. Several were valuable animals, beboarded for citizens.

John Jephson, a groom, is dead; thirteen horses were destroyed; the livery of McAdam & Ferguson, situated at the rear of Jos. Smith's cigar factory, was completely burned out, and the latter factory was seriously damaged, by a fire that started in the front part of the livery at 2:05 this

It was thought that another man might have been lost in the fire, but after a thorough search no other bodies were discovered.

It was stated by Mr. McAdam, one of the owners of the livery, that Jepson was the only man in the building. The body was removed to George Logan's undertaking parlors to await

the action of the coroner. The Rex Cigar Company suffered heavy loss by smoke and water.

Other buildings, in the neighborhood were also damaged. The blaze was first noticed by Sergt. Monahan at 2:05 o'clock. By that time, the fire had gained considerable headway, and flames were coming pletely gutted the place.

Fire was pouring out the brick archway which leads to Dundas street, in a stream, and sparks and smoke filled the street for a considerable distance. At that time it looked as if the whole block would be destroyed. There are a score of buildings very close to the burning stable, and it was thought impossible to confine the blaze to the one building.

Chief Aitken and his men attacked the fire from all sides, and soon had many streams pouring into it.

The fire got into the elevator shaft of Jos. Smith's cigar factory, and the chief personally directed a detachment at that point to prevent a further spread of the blaze. It was with some difficulty that the firemen succeeded in stopping the flames, but they did so and one stream was kept constantly playing on this building to prevent its


