

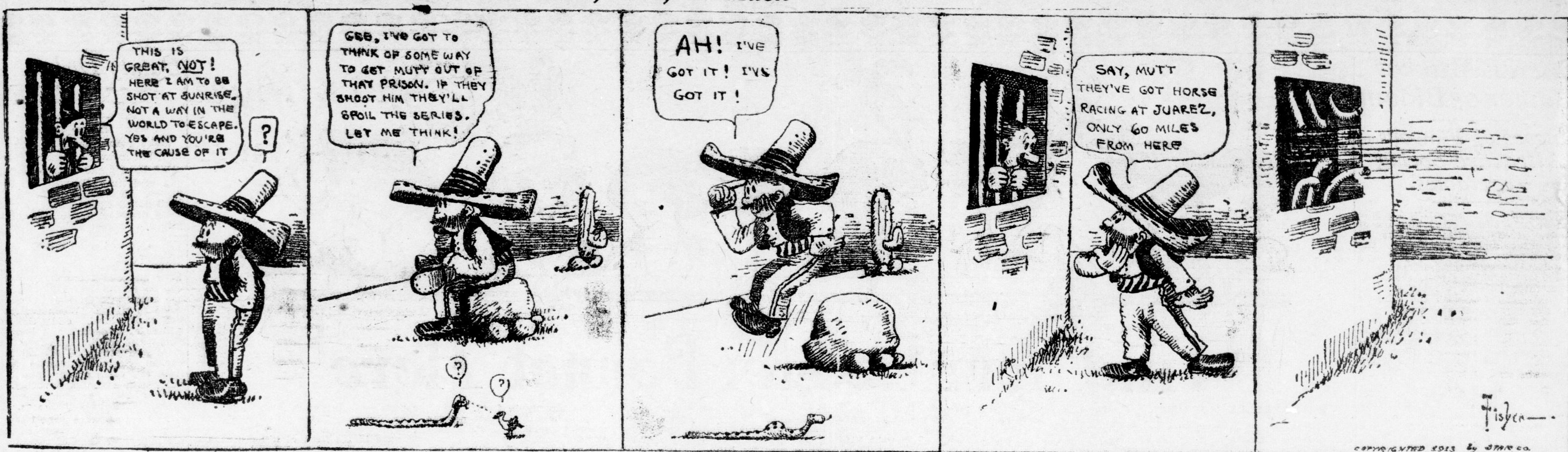

to play ball this coming season. It is
a peculiar thing that the warm wind
and hot sun that thaw the winter
snows also pierce the hold-outs' hide
and thaw his determination to quit
the game unless given a princely salary
and bonus enough to buy a steam
yacht and keep a six-cylinder joy
buggy.

Repetition of Last Year.

Just about this time last year the

AND ORGANIZESE. A. Rea Elected New Presi-
dent and J. M. Mc-
Cutcheon Is Vice-Presi-
dent—Bright Prospects
Ahead of Association.Stratford, March 21.—The Western
Football Association started its new
year auspiciously here today in annual
session with reports of a banner season
in 1912 and plans laid for another
grand year.The following affiliations were made:
Seniors, Stratford and Woodstock; in-
termediates, Galt Caledonians, Berlin
Tigers, Midway Stars, Hespeler and
St. George; Juniors, Tavistock Mar-
lboroughs; Hough Cup, Clinton and Lis-
towel Collegiates. The prospects are
for a large number of entries in each
of the three series.

St. Marys Must Settle.

Recommendations adopted were:
That referees be paid \$4 and expenses
per game; that the W. F. A. protest
strongly against the attitude of the
Dominion Football Association toward
semi-professionalism by using players
of the newly-organized professional
football league in Canada.St. Marys was refused affiliation un-
til the club settles Woodstock's claim
against it.The following amendments were
adopted by the association:The affiliation fee was increased
from \$3 to \$5, and a sum not to ex-
ceed half the total affiliation fees is
to be set apart for the purchase of
medals for the champion teams.The protest committee must meet
within five days after the defence has
been filed with the secretary.The holders of Association cups must
forward to the secretary the trophies
by May 20 each year, to be engraved
at the association's expense.Including continuation schools and
Woodstock Baptist College as eligible
for the Hough Cup series.

ONE ORGANIZATIONC. L. A. and O. L. A. Affiliated
Into One Body at Meeting
Yesterday.Toronto, March 22.—The provin-
cial body to represent Ontario in the
Canadian Amateur Lacrosse Association
was organized yesterday and is
now in full working order, with Fred
R. Sinkins, of Toronto, president; Dr.
McGibbon, of Bracebridge, and J. Ed.
Hinds, of Orillia, vice-presidents;
Frank Doyle, secretary-treasurer, and
a council of ten members. The play-
ing rules are those that were in force
last year, and the name is the Ontario
Amateur Lacrosse Association.When the old Canadian Lacrosse
Association was organized a quarter
of a century ago, and until quite re-
cently, when the growth of the west
saw the spread of the game, the C. L.
A. was entitled to its name. While al-
ways an Ontario institution, it was
the only amateur governing body for
the national game, and was respon-
sible for all its rules and conditions.Canada has progressed and it has re-
cently been possible to form a Domini-
on body, the Canadian Amateur Lac-
rosse Association, having jurisdiction
throughout the whole country. Onta-
rio set a good example yesterday by
sinking all differences and divisions,
and setting out to maintain the lac-
rosse supremacy of this Province un-
der the one flag and with a united
front.To the gentlemen composing the lac-
rosse commission of the Ontario Am-
ateur Athletic Union, with Mr. Sink-
ins as chairman, are due the sincere
thanks of every lover of lacrosse in
Canada for bringing about this happy
ending.MAY PLACE N. Y. Y. C. IN
EMBARRASSING POSITIONIf Reconsideration Is Given Lipton
Challenge, Race Is Liable To
Prove Farce.[Canadian Press.]
New York, March 22.—In yachting
circles there was gossip today that the
"reconsideration" which the Royal
Ulster Yacht Club has asked the New
York Yacht Club to make of its re-
fusal to accept Sir Thomas Lipton's
challenge for the America's cup, will
place the New York Club in an em-
barrassing position. It is rumored that
Sir Thomas will eliminate any condi-
tion that the defending boat not ex-
ceed 75 feet in length, but challenging
with a 75-footer he will enter a race,
if it is possible, to obtain one, against
any challenger from 60 to 90 feet in
length, as provided in the deed of gift
of the America's cup. Yachtsmen ex-
pressed the opinion that if this pro-
position was made the New York Club
would be forced to accept the chal-
lenge and if a 90-foot boat was used
as the defender, the race would be so
much of a farce that the American
yachtsmen would be held up to ridicule.
It was reported today that the New
York Club might reply to the Royal
Ulster Club as early as Monday next,
although the regular meeting of the
club is not scheduled until Thursday.ROBERT E. TOD WILL
BUILD RACING SCHOONERMay Be Preparing to Defend Amer-
ica's Cup If Challenge for Race
With Schooners Is Made.[Canadian Press.]
New York, March 22.—Robert E.
Tod, former commodore of the Atlantic
Yacht Club and a member of the New
York and other yacht clubs, has or-
dered from the makers another schoon-
er yacht that is to be an enlarged
"Westward" it was learned today. The
yacht will measure 115 feet on the
water line, 18 feet longer than the
Westward. Commodore Tod's last
yacht was the three-masted schooner
Karina, in which he cruised in Eu-
ropean waters last year. Commodore
Tod is well known as an amateur nav-
igator. In 1905 he was owner and
navigator of the schooner Thistle dur-
ing the race for the German Emper-
or's cup, in which eleven yachts start-
ed from Sandy Hook. Yachtsmen who
heard today of his decision to build a
racing yacht of the limit length for
schooners, mention in the deed of gift
of the America's cup, hinted that he
might have the defence of the trophy
in mind in case a challenge or a race
with schooners should arrive.
