"Stay In Ontario" Is Making Prices Better

Ridgeway, Jan. 27.—Mr. Thos. Pease, of Ruthven, recently paid \$24,500 for 200 acres of land on Talbot street, in Howard, near Morpeth. To Mr. J. D. Conway he paid \$12,500 for 100 acres, and for the adjoining 100 acres he paid Mr. Joseph Spencer \$12,000. These figures show the trend upward in land values in this favored section of Ontario.

Mr. J. D. Brien has arrived home from Ottawa, where he attended the big stock show. He showed for E. Brien & Son sheep and hogs, and one Short-horn heifer, on which he secured first prize. The animal was sold for a big price to "Heart's Delight Farm," Chazy, N. Y.

P. J. Henry has shipped in the past three days eleven carloads of cattle. One hundred head of these were of his own feeding, and averaged 1,630 pounds. There is not a week goes by but that Mr. Henry ships two or three cars of cattle from here.

Every Department of Delaware Presbyterian Church Is In Flourishing Shape.

ENDED HER LIFE

Mrs. Charles Smith Took Carbolic Acid at St. Thomas.

FATAL COLLISION OF ELEVATED CARS

Policeman Killed and Fourteen Persons Injured in New York Wreck

New York, Jan. 26.—A young policeman was killed and fourteen passengers were injured at 3:21 o'clock yesterday afternoon in a rear-end collision, between southbound trains on the Third Avenue elevated railroad between Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets.

Only three of those hurt were sent to a hospital after the smash. Two cars burned, but the dead body and the injured victims had been taken out before the flames enveloped them.

The dead man is John M. Gleason, 23, single, patrolman attached to Macdonald street station, 241 East One Hundred and Thirty-third street.

The minute that the smash came there was a short circuiting of wires, and blue flames flicked their way through the floors of the cars and splintered from the wrecked controller box, setting fire to the woodwork.

The rammed train, a five-car South Ferry local, had been halted by a flagman standing guard over men making track repairs. The colliding train, a seven-car City Hall local, bumped hard enough to jam the rear car of the first train several feet inside the first car of the second.

It was generally agreed after the accident that had the second train been hitting up speed the flimsy cars would have been torn apart and there would have been great loss of life. As it was the two cars that stood the brunt of the ramming, splintered, ripped and telescoped each other.

GENERAL SICKLE MAY BE ARRESTED

Spectacular Career of Hero of American Civil War Is Recalled.

New York, Jan. 26.—Gen. Daniel E. Sickles sat amid the war relics in his Fifth avenue home tonight, expecting momentarily arrest in a suit brought by the state to recover \$28,746 for which he has failed to account, it is charged, as chairman of the New York monuments commission. Within his call were his son, Stanton, and an aged negro retainer. Save for them he was alone.

The order for the veteran's arrest, issued this afternoon by Supreme Court Justice Ridd, in Albany, and a copy of the complaint was placed in Sheriff Harbidge's hands. The complaint, by Deputy Attorney-General Francis Kennedy, who brought them here.

It was the intention at first to place the veteran under arrest today, but inasmuch as he is 83 years old, and in poor health it was decided to defer action until Monday, so that possibility of his being locked up in the Tombs over Sunday would be avoided.

Unless Gen. Sickles is prepared to furnish a \$20,000 bond, Sheriff Harbidge said, he will have to go to the Tombs until the bond is forthcoming. There was no inkling tonight as to who, if anyone, would come to the veteran's aid.

Gen. Sickles declined to see callers, or to comment on the charges against him. His aged negro servant met all comers at the door, and turned them away.

WANTS THE MONEY

No Trace of Fund For Tunnel Baby Can Be Found.

Chicago, Jan. 26.—A vanished "fund" for a train-born babe has prompted the father, Max Becker, 3131 West Fourteenth Place, to make an international search for the missing \$200 which is said to have been collected. Authorities in this country and Canada have been asked to assist in running down the supposedly misappropriated funds. The money, coming from Toronto to Chicago on a Grand Trunk train, gave birth to the child while traversing the Sarnia Tunnel, and according to a newspaper correspondent, sympathetic passengers raised a fund of \$200. No such gift, however, has found its way to the intended beneficiary.

WILL DIVIDE \$3,000

Windsor Citizens Will Benefit By Sale of Indian Lands.

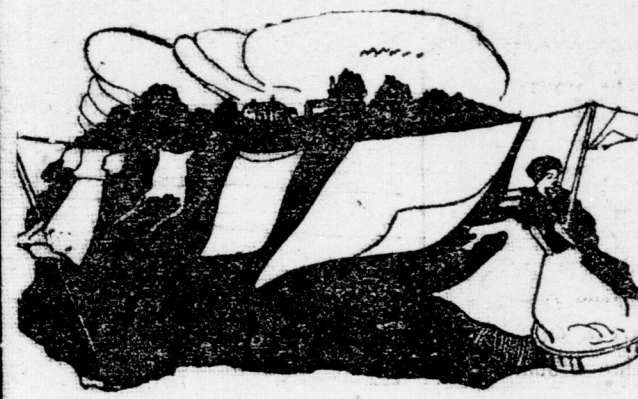

Uncle Sam's Great Naval Fighter Entombed at Annapolis.

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 27.—In the fitting surroundings of the splendid chapel, the architectural crown of the great group of buildings in which the American naval officers of the future are being trained, the body of John Paul Jones, the first great naval fighter of the nation, was laid away this morning in the crypt specially prepared to keep it safely for all times. In view of the elaborate ceremonies in which the body was welcomed to this country on July 24, 1905, and when it was transferred to Bancroft Hall on April 24 of the following year, the ceremonies today were simple, but they were in every way fitting and impressive.

The guests of honor were Ambassador Jusserand, of France; General Horace Porter, to whose work while ambassador of this country to France the recovery and identification of the body was due; Secretary of the Navy Meyer, Governor of Maryland, and the Hon. Lemuel P. Baggett, of the naval committee of the House, and others.
