MORRISON GIVES IN TO WINNIPEG RUMOR

Said He Will Admit Enough Corruption to Void Election.

Winnipeg, Nov. 9.—Alex. Morrison, M. P. for Macdonald, has thrown up the sponge in the petition launched against his election by the Liberals, according to reports here tonight. It is understood that when the case is called tomorrow for Morrison will admit enough corruption to void the election. Costs will go against Morrison.

The admission of enough corruption to void the election if it is admitted, as is said tonight, will be the case, is significant, in view of the fact that Morrison carried the seat by a majority of seven hundred in the by-election. This is the contest in which Liberal workers were arrested on various pretexts, which were afterwards proved to have no foundation. Two Conservative workers were tried in secret on charges of grave irregularities and allowed to go with the infliction of fines, one pleading guilty. The Liberals have pressed the charges against Morrison in the face of many obstacles which have resulted in long delays.

ADELAIDE BAPTIST MISSION CIRCLE

Entertaining and Instructive Evening For Lady Mission Workers.

A meeting of unusual interest was held in the Adelaide Street Baptist Church on Thursday evening under the auspices of the Mission Circle, with the honorary members in charge, Mr. George Benson acting in the capacity of chairman.

After the opening exercises, which included Scripture reading by Mr. Benson and prayer by Rev. W. Haverstock, the secretary of the circle read the annual report, which was most encouraging, showing an advance in all departments of work undertaken by the circle.

Some delightful musical selections were then given, including numbers by the church quartette, Mr. Downs, Miss Boyd, Mrs. Brown and Miss Lily Lister, with Miss Boyd acting as accompanist.

The speaker of the evening, Rev. John Kolesnikoff, of Toronto, a Russian missionary, who is in charge of the non-English work there was introduced, and for an hour held the close attention of the large audience as he related the story of the beginning of his work in Toronto, and its steady advance, until now there are missions established in different parts of the city with flourishing night schools.

Under his supervision missions have been started and are doing a splendid work in Montreal, Hamilton, Port William, and other places, while Welland, Sudbury, London and other towns are urging him to come to their help in the same capacity.

Mr. Kolesnikoff is unusually equipped for work among the foreigners who are in our own land in such numbers, speaking as he does seven different languages.

An offering for his work was then taken, and this part of the meeting brought to a close in a few well-timed and impressive words by Pastor Boyd, after which the singing of hymns and home-made candy helped to make a social half-hour most enjoyable.

DEADLOCK UNBROKEN

No Progress on United States Currency Bill in Committee.

Washington, Nov. 9.—The deadlock over the administration currency bill in the Senate banking committee continued yesterday, and the administration supporters, by a vote, six to six, failed to carry a proposal to increase the number of regional reserve banks.

Senator O'Gorman proposed a resolution to allow the federal reserve board to fix the number of banks at not less than four, nor more than eight.

The line-up again showed the deadlock. The petition for a Democratic conference to discuss the currency bill is signed by a number of senators today when it became known that the committee was deadlocked.

THREE TRAPPERS LOST

Upturned Canoe Was Found in Centre of a Lake.

Dryden, Ont., Nov. 9.—Any hope that three trappers, missing since Oct. 22, were alive was dissipated yesterday afternoon when Provincial Constable Simpson, of Kenora, returned to Dryden from the scene of the tragedy. On arrival at Beaver Lake, on whose shore the unfortunate young men had fixed their camps, he found their upturned canoe in the centre of the lake half a mile from the shore. The lake was frozen over to a depth of four inches, so it was decided that no attempt to recover the bodies would be possible until now.

The actual facts regarding the tragedy will never be known, but it is thought that the sad event occurred the day following their arrival at camp, and that while removing supplies across the lake their canoe upset, precipitating its occupants into the ice-cold water. The victims are: Hugh Nicholson, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Nicholson, farmers, and D. John Barker, both of Dryden, and Joseph J. Edgar, who came here a month ago with John Barker from Whitewater. Man's parents reside at Drumhoney, Whitesburg, County Antrim, Ireland.
