OFFICER "HIKED" TO HELP A PRIVATE

Surrendered Seat in Auto So That Indian Would Reach Camp in Time.

Hon. Col. A. E. Somerville, of the Twenty-sixth (Middlesex) Regiment, has a large heart. At least his fellow officers in the regiment say so, and they should know on account of being associated with him continually.

They point out the evidence of their contention the fact that any man who will get out of his own automobile in order that an Indian, a private in the regiment, may ride into camp, so that he would not be censured for overstaying the time limit of his leave-of-absence, must have a large heart.

One of the Indians at the Heights this year has a relative in Muncey, who is very ill. Sunday the man obtained permission to visit the sick one. He was on his way back after visiting the relative, and, although exhausted, was hurrying to get into camp in time, when an officer in an automobile, also on his way to camp.

The story goes that the officer, realizing the predicament of the man, got out of his car, told the man to take his place, and walked into the Heights, nearly an hour late, while the Indian arrived in plenty of time.

The Indian is uncommunicative, and refuses to say anything about it. Col. Somerville is a kindly man, but the same attitude as the Indian, but the story leaked out, and is going the rounds, and Col. Somerville has, if possible, become even more popular.

PLEADS FOR MUSIC WITH HUMAN APPEAL

Delightful Lecture-Recital by Madame Stephali at Auditorium Last Night.

If you have been wont to confuse the world of art and artists with freaks, eccentrics, and madmen, with egotistic personalities, and that mild-eyed insanity that is supposed to be the hall-mark of genius and greatness, go and hear Sofia Stephali at the Auditorium tonight and you will be delightfully disillusioned. If you have been clinging to the fond belief that art and music exist for the exclusive enjoyment of a few highly-vrought, nervously-strung, neurotic, impressionable, finely appreciative temperamentalists, Madame Stephali will crush and rudely shock you. She is a really accomplished artist. Were the standards of art in vogue to-day more moral and sane, she would be at once acclaimed as a great artist. She is a woman of the highest calibre, a promise by adopting some little freakiness of personality that the musical high-brows would deign to accept as the olive-branch of peace, undoubtedly the elect would have been her, and she would have grown like that of De Paganini and Paderewski. But she chooses to dress with the most perfect taste, without the least affectation, and to use her beautiful and clear mezzo-soprano voice in singing well-chosen selections in a way that everyone can understand.

Sings in English.
Most of her songs are sung in English, and one knows from her first words that they are in English. The question which a musical audience usually has to decide before it can begin to appreciate a song, namely, whether the singer is singing in English or in some foreign tongue, is obviated at once when Stephali begins to sing. She will be difficult for the Culturists and other songsters to beat, for she gives her for her extremely rude, unpolished, and unrefined, but she has a genuine zeal in attempting to interest the average man in the world of music. In her address on the "Importance of Music," which preceded her recital Monday night, she observed that the middle classes have largely lost the primal attachment of humanity to music.

And she lays at the door of the peculiar evolutions in the musical world, the loss of this attachment. She charges the music too, and at only an aesthetic and restricted appeal. Music has lost its humanity, its motive and power, according to Stephali, and she comes from and produces every emotion to which man is given, but the use of song to produce mood or action was understood far better in the earlier days of the human race. An exception to this reflection, however, is the use of songs by Protestant missionaries in revival and evangelistic services. To the Roman Catholics in their services, music has much the same significance as it has to the faithful Mohammedan who at a certain bell-note turns his face to the east in prayer, she claims.

The emotional value of music, Madame Stephali emphasized strongly. The primal strains of music that rose to the lips of the cave dweller and the cave mother had their origin in emotions. Great music always thrills with the motions of life.

Want Less Ragtime.
"We need more music and better music, music that is closer to life," said Stephali. "We want less ragtime and more life-time music. We want simple, lovely songs, disengaged on the one hand, the elaborate and affected, and on the other, the worthless and the meaningless."

Few singers are so very fortunate in their accompanists as is Madame Stephali. Miss Berenice Lathrop plays well, but not too well. She plays with a taste and sympathy, a precision and a sense of time and technique and expression that exactly suits the singer. Her work on the piano is all that is required, and she stops there just where she ought to. Some accompanists are inadequate. Others play as if they were jealous of the artist they are playing for. One can scarcely fail to observe the perfect sympathy existing between Madame Stephali and her accompanist.

The program was happily chosen, simple, beautiful and harmonious. "Ever on Earth," by Robert Just, a Chicago composer, is an exquisitely beautiful piece. The adagio "Exquisite" is used not with malice but with forethought. "Down in Nod-a-way," by Gaynor, is a petite, lilting, dancing re-

train, which the versatile, unaffected and natural Stephali well knows how to interpret. Bond's "A Perfect Day" was simply and delightfully rendered. In Meyerbeer's "Deer Prophet," scene Cavatine and Aria, Stephali admirably pictures forth the warring of the primal, God-implanted emotions of the mother's heart with the stinging consciousness of a son's ingratitude. Her rendering of De Pinna's "Gaily Chant the Summer Birds" thrills with the wholesome melody of forests and wild songsters, and breathes the sweetness of meadow flowers and the freedom and unaffected joyousness of the sunshine.

Wholesome art, music with a human appeal, harmonious life and joyous, natural living; of these things Stephali is the prophetess, the forerunner, the sane, useful dreamer, who not only dreams but sings, and, judging from her cordial and delightful personality, also lives her message.

This afternoon she lectures on "Music and Childhood," this evening on "Music and Life," with illustrative songs for each lecture.

Industrial School Issues Circular

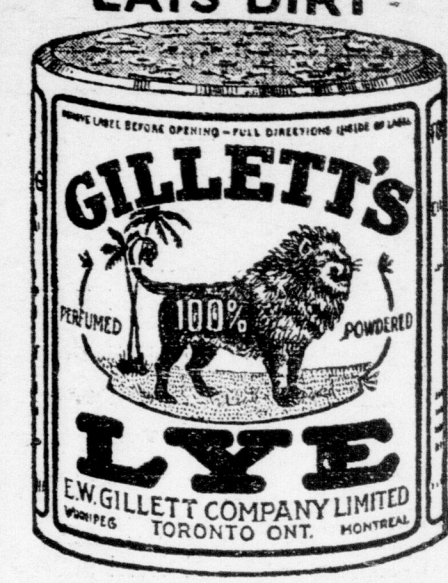
Explains To Parents Great Advantage of Training For Boys and Girls.

CITY DINES CAMP STAFF

Mayor Graham Says London Will Secure Permanent Grounds.

RECEPTION AT ARMORIES

At the Tecumseh House on Monday evening, the mayor and city council entertained Col. Hodgins and his staff at dinner. Some thirty officers were present, and some of the members of the council. The gathering was an informal affair.

Mayor Graham said that the city intends to secure permanent quarters for the camp by next year. If the necessary land can be secured, London will have the camp permanently. When the land is secured, the mayor and aldermen were the guests of the officers of the Seventh Regiment at the Armories. The Seventh Regiment Band rendered a fine program of good music for the occasion.

A MONSTER CHIMNEY
New Stack of the McClary Company a Fine Piece of Work.
The new, monster chimney in the McClary plant at York and Wellington streets was built in the record time of twelve days. It is 125 feet high, is built of a special patented brick, reinforced with concrete, making a practically a solid pillar. The chimney is 12 feet 2 1/4 inches in diameter at the base, and 6 feet 8 inches across at the top. The base is solid concrete 18 feet thick. Nearly 25,000 of the special brick, which is perforated in the centre to allow the concrete to be poured in, are used in its construction. Standing inside it gives one the impression of being in the bowels of the earth, and makes one imagine that being thrown into the bottomless pit is not without its terrors.

No accidents have occurred during its construction, and the foreman on the job says that when they do occur it is generally to inexperienced help. So it seems that although it would appear to the uninitiated to be a dangerous occupation, it is not. The men at work on the stack are all experienced, and everything has been done without a hitch. The stack is built by the Alphonso Custodis Chimney Construction Company, of New York, and they are specialists in the work.

There are a number of the same kind of stacks all over the United States and Canada. The McClary Company has one at the foundry and one at the up-town plant.
