

MANUFACTURERS ASK DAYLIGHT - SAVING FOR THE COUNTRY

Want Government to Take
Action Without Delay.

CONVENTION AT AN END
Resolution Favors Mobiliza-
tion of Resources of the
Entire Dominion.

HAMILTON, June 15.—The closing business sessions of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association held today on board the steamer Corona, on the trips to and from Niagara Falls, where the camp was inspected.

Among the resolutions passed were: That the association would approve any scheme for complete and effective mobilization of the entire resources in Canada and man and material which should be placed unreservedly at the disposal of the country; that the Government be memorialized to bring in legislation providing for daylight saving with the least possible delay; that the Federal Government be requested to remove the excise duty on alcohol under suitable regulations and restrictions; that the association favoring preferential tariffs for closer economic union between the Allies; the development of inter-imperial trade and placing the products of enemy countries under such fiscal and other disabilities as will effectively restrict their sales in these markets.

It was also advocated that the Government liberally encourage by subsidies or otherwise the establishment of a ship-building industry in Canada on a permanent and profitable basis, and that a special committee be appointed for action and work out details be appointed.

The association also recorded its belief that scientific and industrial research should be developed on a scale commensurate with Canada's resources.

The following officers were elected: President, Hon. C. D. Thomas, Minister of the Navy, Ottawa; Vice-President, S. R. Parsons, Toronto; Second Vice-President, W. J. Butman, Winnipeg; Treasurer, George Booth, Toronto. An executive committee covering all industrial districts in the Dominion was also appointed.

WINDSOR, June 15.—Miss Myrtle Taylor, aged 15 years, daughter of Henry Taylor, hotelkeeper of Belle River, lies in the Hotel Dieu in a critical condition as a result of falling from a Grand Trunk train entering Belle River Wednesday afternoon.

Miss Taylor was returning from Chatham Collegiate Institute, and was on the vestibule ready to get off when the train stopped, and then jerked forward. She was thrown forward on her head.

She was rushed to the hospital where unconscious. Her skull was fractured, and her recovery is doubtful.

STRATHROY MINISTER IS BAPTIST MODERATOR MIDDLESEX-LAMBTON

Rev. Mr. Collins Chosen at Convention
in Poplar Hill—Interesting Reports.

POPULAR HILL, June 15.—Rev. Jos. W. Kemp of New York, gave the opening address at the Middlesex-Lambton Baptist Association today. His subject was "Between the Two Appearings." The "Relation of the Local Church to Denominational Interests" was presented by Rev. R. M. McKay of Sarnia, in a vigorous address.

The officers for the coming year were elected as follows: Moderator, Mr. Collins, Strathroy; clerk, Rev. A. J. Loveday, Old Springs; preacher of annual sermon, Rev. John Trickey, Poplar Hill; alternate, Rev. C. P. McFarlane, Mount Brydges.

Professor J. H. Farmer of McMaster Hall, Toronto, was present to speak on "Christian Education," and presented his theme in his usual incisive and comprehensive manner. A resolution was carried urging the churches to contribute to the special offering asked for by the university on Sunday, June 25.

Rev. J. H. Boyd, London, presented the report on the state of religion among the churches. It was on the whole of a discouraging nature, as there had been a decrease in membership and contributions. Many of the churches, however, sent letters of hopeful tone. The work among the young people was encouraging and good work has been done.

The afternoon session on Wednesday commenced with another helpful Bible exposition by Rev. Joseph Kemp of New York on "The Filling of the Holy Spirit."

Rev. S. Hughson, D. D., of Stratford, spoke in the interests of publication work. This was followed by the address of Moderator Arthur H. Bligh of London. He took up the subject of "The Need of the Baptist Message for the World in the Present Day" and declared that the vital principles of the Gospel are being preached in all parts of the world.

Rev. A. J. Loveday presented the Sunday school report, which showed a decrease in enrollment. An in- crease of \$136.56 in gifts to missions had taken place in Sunday school contributions.

Rev. C. K. Dayfoot, general superintendent of Sunday school work, conducted an open conference and dealt with Sunday school work.

In the number of baptisms reported in the association 30 per cent were from the Sunday school.

The evening session opened with a song service, conducted by Rev. H. H. Sinclair, Windsor, and Rev. H. E. Glegg, "Western Mission," as his subject. He later came from the west. He told of people driving eighteen miles to church on his field, which was fifty miles. The evening address was by Rev. J. Mackay, Toronto; Prof. Patterson, London; J. A. Allan, Regina, and President Grant.

The annual sermon was preached by Rev. A. A. Fanjoy of Alisa Craig, and based on "The Call to Macedonia."

Rev. Joseph W. Kemp gave another inspiring address, taking as his topic, "Prayer Without Ceasing." The speaker asked: "Is prayer a lost art, or a forgotten secret?" A noted writer had answered this question in the affirmative and many ministers had also stated the same as a fact. "Why are so many prayers unanswered?" he asked. "The answer lies in the fact that somewhere there has been a break between us and God. Iniquity in the heart will stifle any prayer."

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ASSEMBLY NAMES A NEW COMMITTEE ON CHURCH UNION

President Falconer Convener
—Rev. D. C. MacGregor of
London a Member.

DR. A. S. GRANT RESIGNS Severs Himself From All His Official Positions in the Church.

WINNIPEG, June 15.—A committee was named by the Presbyterian General Assembly this afternoon with President Falconer of the University of Toronto, as convener, to consider all matters in connection with the union of the Presbyterian Church with the Methodist and Congregational Churches.

It was explained that this committee would have two chief functions: To secure legal advice and prepare legislation, which in time will be required, and to confer with similar committees from the other churches in discussions of various undertakings in which there is to be co-operation. This committee succeeds the old union committee which has now ceased to be.

The new committee is made up as follows: President Falconer, Dr. Baird, Dr. Jack, Dr. Foster, Rev. MacIntyre, Dr. Wilson, Rev. H. W. Ross, Rev. G. A. Strang, Dr. W. J. Clark, Dr. Hanson, Dr. Herdridge, Dr. J. H. Turnbull, Dr. Wallace, Dr. Gaudier, Dr. MacIntyre, Dr. C. C. McGregor, Rev. Mr. Martin, Rev. Dr. Fraser, Dr. W. A. MacKinnon, Dr. Dyde, Rev. D. J. Wilson, and elders as follows: C. H. Mitchell, Judge Forbes, Mr. Justice Archibald, Prof. Matheson, Mr. Justice Sutherland, Hamilton, Mr. J. K. MacDonald, Isaac Pitblado, Mr. Justice Stewart and President Murray.

To Prepare Pastoral Letter.
Rev. Dr. John Neil, proposed that the moderator prepare a pastoral letter explaining exactly what the assembly had done in the matter of self completely from this letter to be read in all the Presbyterian churches. This was agreed.

A telegram was read to the assembly from Dr. Silcox of the Congregational Church expressing congratulations on the success of the union movement.

President Oliver of the Saskatchewan Theological College, who appeared in the moderator's preparation of the letter, presented a resolution calling on the Federal Government to proceed with the mobilization of the military resources of the country and to consent to assist in recruiting. Principal Oliver is not a member of the assembly so the motion was submitted by Principal MacKay of Vancouver and was unanimously adopted.

Dr. Grant Resigns.
Dr. A. S. Grant, who for the last five years has been the most prominent executive of the denomination, resigned the office of superintendent of home missions, thus severing himself completely from the official positions he has held.

In the forenoon he surrendered his post as chairman of the board of finance. Dr. Grant will continue to act as superintendent of home missions until a successor is appointed.

The assembly named a commission to select all home mission positions, including the selection of a new head for the work, as follows: Revs. Dr. Baird, Winnipeg; Dr. Love, Quebec; Dr. Herdridge, Ottawa; Bruce Taylor, Montreal; MacGillivray, Kingston; Pogue, Peterboro; Turnbull, Toronto; Neil, Toronto; Sedgwick, Hamilton; Sinclair, Winnipeg; McKinnon, Regina; and the following elders: John Loudon, Toronto; Dr. Kelly, Montreal; Prof. Matheson, Kingston; Alex. Auld, Toronto; President Falconer, Toronto; Mr. Justice Sutherland, Toronto; P. Mackay, Toronto; Prof. Patterson, London; J. A. Allan, Regina, and President Grant.

New Finance Chairman.
The assembly appointed John A. Patterson, K. C., Toronto, chairman of the board of finance, in succession to Dr. A. S. Grant.

At the evening session it was agreed that Rev. Dr. John Neil of Toronto should act as convener of the home mission committee, succeeding Rev. Dr. A. S. Grant. Dr. Neil will serve only until the special commission to select all home mission positions is appointed.

A special minute was presented expressing high appreciation of Rev. Dr. Grant's services, and this was passed by a standing vote.

A committee was named to prepare a reply to the dissent recorded by Rev. Herbert Campbell, on the question of church union, as follows: Rev. Principal Chandler, President Falconer, Rev. Dr. R. D. Fraser, Rev. Dr. D. M. Ramsay and John A. Patterson.

Dr. Grant's Work.
Dr. Grant was made chairman of the board of finance four years ago after the meeting of the assembly in Edmonton. He was extremely reluctant to accept the post at the time, since he was already burdened with work as general superintendent of home missions. It is also a law of the church that the moderator cannot be on the board of finance and also on any other board. An exception was made in the case of Dr. Grant. The ordinary law of home missions was followed.

A Real Estate Transaction.
Two hours of the assembly's time was taken up with consideration of a real estate transaction, in which Rev. Robert Howie of Winnipeg and Rev. A. S. Grant were interested. Mr. Howie bought this land and approached Rev. Dr. Grant with a proposition to establish a Boy's Scout movement. Rev. Dr. Grant agreed to help, provided he could get the money, and Dr. Charles Gordon and some other Winnipeg people became interested. Hard times then came on, and the deal could not be put through. Mr. Howie wanted the assembly to investigate the matter, but the commissioners discussed today the effect the decision on the union question would have on the future of the church. Without doubt Manitoba will seriously affect the future of the union. There are at least a dozen of these churches in Winnipeg, regarding which a conference will be held in the near future.

Concludes Work Today.
Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell and Rev. Dr. Ephraim Scott, the leaders of the opposition to the union, were both active on regular work of the general assembly today. It is not expected today by the majority of the commissioners that the movement for the continuation of the Presbyterian Church will seriously affect the future of the union. There are at least a dozen of these churches in Winnipeg, regarding which a conference will be held in the near future.
