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CROWN PRINCE LOSES IN HEAVY ATTACKS ON THE VERDUN LINE

Prisoners Taken by French Exceed 5,000.

BRITISH DRIVE OFF Foe

Attack on Staff Trench Results in Heavy Casualties to Germans.

PARIS, Oct. 26.-The Germans made four successive violent attacks on the Verdun front against the Douaumont positions today, but all failed, according to the bulletin issued by the war office tonight. The number of prisoners up to date is over 5,000.

The statement says: "North of the Somme an attempt at attack by the enemy against the Bois l'Abbaye farm, south of Bouchevaux, was easily repulsed. The artillery struggle continued very lively in the region of Sully-Suffisil and also south of the Somme in the sector of Verman-douillers-Chauleux.

"On the Verdun front one day was marked by violent enemy attacks. Attacks on successive times the German attacked positions which we had gained from them in the Douaumont region. At 8:30 o'clock in the morning and at 2:30 p.m. two attacks directed on the fort and on the front to the east were shattered by our artillery and infantry fire, despite the intense bombardment which they were preceded and accompanied.

"At 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon a third and very powerful attack which debouched from the Douaumont wood was taken under the fire of our batteries and machine guns. Four waves of assault were thrown back in disorder and the enemy sustained considerable losses. Isolated enemy elements which succeeded in approaching our first line were made prisoner. The fourth attempt against our trenches to the south of Chauffour wood was also completely defeated. Our front has been entirely maintained.

Prisoners Number 5,000.

"The total prisoners counted up to the present exceeds 5,000. To these must be added several hundred wounded picked up by our ambulances.

"Everywhere else the day was quiet." Following is the official announcement made this afternoon:

"On the Verdun front the situation is unchanged. The enemy made no counter-attack during the night, contenting himself with bombarding violently the sectors of Vaux and Douaumont. Elsewhere the night was calm.

"A German aeroplane was seen in the region of Vauquois, in the neighborhood of our lines, by minor gunfire. One of our pilots attacked from a height of 100 meters an artillery column on the road between Conflans and Etain and destroyed the engine and the drivers fled, abandoning their teams."

Attack on British Falls.

LONDON, Oct. 26.-Official statement from headquarters in France, issued tonight, reads:

"The morning, after a bombardment of the enemy directed against the Staff trench, which runs northward of the Staff trench, our artillery proved very effective. Only one prisoner remained in our hands.

During the day the enemy artillery was active in the front south of the Ancre and in the neighborhood of Loos and Pothuivillers.

Despite the unfavorable weather our operations were carried out successfully with our artillery and bombers. Many enemy billets and depots. Three of our machines have not returned."

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WEST CANADA FARMERS NEVER SO PROSPEROUS

G. T. P. Looks for Large Influx of Settlers From U. S. A. After War.

Montreal, Oct. 27.-"All indications show that the volume of immigration into Canada from the United States at the close of war will be remarkably large," said Mr. W. P. Hinton, traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, who arrived here today.

Mr. Hinton reports a very gratifying movement of settlers into Western Canada during the last summer. These settlers have been possessed of considerable means and good equipment. They were doubtless attracted by the lowered prices of farm lands, which generally prevailed, and by the certainty that even if one crop can be secured, equal to the general yield of last year, the entire purchase price of the land will be regained.

"Western Canada," said Mr. Hinton, "is on the eve of tremendous development and prosperity. Splendid prices have been obtained for the grain. The crop movement was deferred by fully a month, but October weather has been extremely favorable for threshing and shipping, and the grain is now moving freely, and this will further stimulate trade.

The country districts, at no time within the past year, have been able to secure their full supplies, as it seems quite impossible for eastern manufacturers to keep the demand supplied promptly. Farmers are exceedingly prosperous; their purchasing power is never so great, and perhaps a strike of the production of this fact is that approximately \$2,000,000 more than any other year has been expended on rural population in the purchase of automobiles. In fact the automobile seems to have become a farm necessity, and even if we are disposed to consider it an extravagance, it certainly adds to the joy of living in the agricultural districts of Canada.

"If we had our 150,000 men we have sent to the front with us again it would make speeding up of eastern manufacturers and the British over the necessities of life in the west."

LIVE HOGS ON LOCAL MARKET STEADY - Rain Keeps Producers Afloat.

Rain was chiefly responsible for a small local market this morning. Little hay was brought in, and the price was steady at \$12 to \$14.25 a ton. Straw was very scarce and steady at \$8.50 to \$9.25 a ton. There was no change in the price of oats. They sold for \$1.80 to \$2 a cwt. for old and \$1.55 to \$1.80 for new. Wheat brought \$1.45 a bushel for old and \$1.55 for old.

Potatoes are in demand and are selling for \$1.70 to \$1.90 a bag. New cabage is selling for \$1.70 to \$1.90 a dozen. Dry beans are selling for \$2.50 a bushel. Apples are fairly plentiful with a brisk sale at 75c to \$1 a bushel. Peas bring \$1 to \$1.25 a bushel. Peaches of good quality are expected that a few will be offered Saturday at 25c to 35c a basket. Grapes are higher at 30c to 35c a basket. Dairy produce is steady. Sales of creamery butter are made for 42c a pound retail. Dairy butter brings 40c to 42c a pound, and eggs 42c a dozen. Poultry prices are firm.

Toronto Police Court Reflects The Results of Prohibition

TORONTO, Oct. 26.-Lieut.-Col. H. J. Grant, for thirty years Toronto's chief of police, in an interview today detailed the effects of prohibition in the city.

From September 15 to October 15, last year, arrests for drunkenness numbered 1,653; for the corresponding period this year, 214. The work of the police force had been greatly lessened, men who were constantly appearing in the police court were now taking money home to their wives, tradesmen were reporting better trade, and in the suburban districts farmers were returning home with the proceeds of their sales intact, without stopping at every hotel on the route. Since the war the force had been reduced by over a hundred, and under the new conditions they would not be replaced.
