



RUSSIA'S RICHEST GREEK CHURCH ON WHITE SEA COAST

Visit To Wonderful 500-Year-Old Monastery of Solovvetsk.

'BRITISH ARMY OF THREE"

Canadian Colonel, Though "Rough Diamond," Better Liked by Men Than Any Other British O. C.

norning, the 26th of July, 1918, Col. Burton asked me to try to find a pilot little village of Knyajaya Guba, on the northwestern shores of the White Sea, where we, a section of the British expeditionary force to North Russia, had been stational for several months. The colonel was a Canadian, considerably more than six feet "in his socks." He was what one would call "a rough diamond," but was liked better than any other British O. C. by his men, a fact which he had every reason to be

wanted a pilot who knew the White Sea, in and out, a pliot who cared neither for a choppy see nor Bolshevist bullets, for Archangel was still in their hands, their crafts were plowing the sea in all directions, and we had to go right down to Kem, a little town on the southwestern side of the White Sea. We had been promised a small steamer, then lying at Kovda village, about 30 miles farther down, but the captain of noved, and the only map available was

In vain did I search the village from one end to another; none of the natives were willing to undertake this job, even though I offered them the most temptes. In the afternoon we had to leave for Kovda without a pilot, hoping to get one down there. We arrived there at midnight, met the Eritish consul, Mr. Teakston, and after many unsuccessful attempts we obtained the reluctant services of a man who had not been as far south as Kem for the last fifteen years. Saturday morning a new disappoint-ment was in store for us. The engineer and firemen refused to undertake the journey. Five young Finns volunteered, and after they had "studied" the engines couple of hours, they were prepared to take us to the other end of the world, if need be. The northern night was beautiful, but the sea was very choppy, and our little steamer was tossed about on the white-crested waves of the White Sea. We rrived outside Kem on Sunday morning. By Sunday night our business was completed, and we were ready to return. But Col. Burton had heard about that wonderful Monastery of Solovyetsk, 500 years old, perhaps the richest Greek church in Russia, and situated about 40

or 50 miles straight east from Kem, and he wanted to see it before we returned. In vain did the pilot and the mate implore him not to go there; the rocks piore inim not to a round Solovyetsh were very numerous, and Bolshevist crafts were still about.

was about 11 o'clock on Sunday night when we caught sight of the numerous cupolas, turrets and towers of the monastery. They stood out shimmering white against the black sky. The picture reminded us more of a mediaeval town of sunny Italy than of a group of Russian buildings just a few miles below the Polar Circle. Through my field glasses I could see hundreds of excited monks gathering on the quay in the picturesque little harbor. But all the sea marks had been removed, and entrance to the Solovyetsh harbor. a difficult task to attempt even in broad daylight. And now the night was already closing in upon us. We crept along very slowly, and the mate was frequently measuring the depth.

Through my glasses I could plainly see several of the monks kneeling down as if in prayer. Why? Had the Bolshe-

It was already midday when we were awakened the following morning by one of the brothers, who brought us our breakfast, consisting of things we had not seen for months, such as milk, fresh butter, and the best of new-laid eggs.

He took us around the whole monastery, showed us their splendid museums and collections, and was particularly anxious to point out to us several of the bombs that the British men-of-war had fired on the monastery during the Crimean War, when a British fleet in 1854 had attacked the forti-

fled monastery.



Soviet Russia's Grandiose Dream of Developing 27,-000,000 Horsepower.

Viborg, Finland, May 13.-Commun ism, plus electrification, is now the slo-gan of the Russian Soviet regime. Reorts of this vast dream of Lenine by which, say sarcastic refugees reaching Finland, he "hopes to make every Rustion but a communistic paradise with a dynamo in the corner" have reached the outside world frequently during the pas ew months, but only recent Moscow and Petrograd newspapers show the vast ex-tent of the proposed electrification of

G. S. Zinovieff, Soviet governor of Petrograd, in a speech at that city, an-nounced that the scheme contemplated the construction all over European Russia and Siberia of huge electric power plants, with a total capacity of 18,170,-000 horsepower in the former, and 9,000,-000 horsepower in Siberia. On this work, he said, are to be employed, as fast as possible, the soldiers who are demobil-




