MIKE McTIGUE BEATS SIKI ON POINTS IN DUBLIN FIGHT

Dublin, March 18.—Mike McTigue, the Irish-American fighter, is now the world's light-heavyweight champion and European heavyweight champion, and Georges Carpentier can no longer regain the henors he lost to "Battling" siki by a return match with the deposed Senegalese.

McTigue gained the decision from siki at the Scala Theatre in a 20-round contest Saturday night. McTigue won a points at the end of the contest, but atter Siki was reported to have disgreed vigorously and expressed his intention of challenging the decision.

Carpentier came from Paris with his manager and sat at the ringside. He watched the progress of the contest not only with intense interest, but apparent tatisfaction. 


