SCHOOL TRUSTEES

MAV SELL VACANT LOTS BY AUCTION

Ground and Building Committee To Make Recommendation.

GRANTS REQUEST

Boys Will Be Allowed To Use the Dakin Street Grounds.

All vacant property owned by the board of education which from present indications will never be used for school purposes will be grouped and sold by auction if the board as a whole acts on a recommendation that will be made by the grounds and building committee.

At a regular meeting of the committee yesterday afternoon the members decided that the board should be asked to dispose of all such property which totals considerable amounts.

This important decision arose out of a simple request by C. Rumble representing an east-end athletic association for the use of the Dakin street property as a baseball diamond for ten boys.

Trustee B. N. Campbell, the chairman, said: "The secretary had been arranging for the sale of the property at once."

"Why not group all vacant property owned by the board and sell it at a big sale?" added Trustee Wilmoth.

The other members considered the suggestion worthy of passing on to the board as a recommendation.

It was decided that the boys should be allowed to use the property until it was sold.

Mr. Hosieler who sold the Trafalgar street property to the board asked permission to buy back one lot on which stands a cottage which he still owns.

The board informed him that it had no desire to sell any of the site until the new school was entirely built.

Mr. Hosieler then asked permission to leave the cottage on the property and he was granted permission to leave it there until such time as he is given notice to remove it.

During the course of the meeting Mr. Campbell informed Senior Inspector V. K. Gaudin that he had received complaints from several citizens that their children who were attending Victoria School were not allowed to enter the front door in many cases it was reported that the children had ruined their shoes tramping back and forth through the front door.

Mr. Greer replied that in no school of the city were the children denied the use of front doors; but as a measure of protection to the nicely decorated fronts, the children were not allowed to run in and out. If they came into the schools through the front door, the children were expected to stay in. The back doors were used generally by children running in and out.

Well, it seems to me that the principal at Victoria School must be very careful," said Mr. Campbell. "I wish you would see that he gives the children a little latitude. I appreciate his efforts to keep things nice, but too much of the children's comfort must not be sacrificed."

Mr. Greer said that the matter would be looked into immediately.

Trustee Udy reported that complaints had been made to him that teachers and pupils were cutting across private lawns.

Mr. Greer said that he recently sent a circular to all the schools warning against the practice.

Mr. Campbell thought too much attention should not be paid to the complaints, as they had been made anonymously.

Mr. Greer asked the board to make an effort to have the Public Utilities Commission redecorate the offices. No action was taken on this matter as it was agreed generally that the work should be done.

Ice In Lake Michigan Bars Rescue Of Men Starving To Death on Island

Grand Rapids, Mich., April 18.—Nine men and a woman are slowly starved to death on Fox Island in Lake Michigan, 18 miles off Northport, Leelanau county, and are unable to reach the mainland on account of the ice in the lake.

Word of their plight was received here last night from Gilman M. Dame, former state food and dairy inspector, who speaks to the Grand Rapids Herald by telephone to obtain an aeroplane from Selfridge Field, Mount Clemens, for their rescue.

JOHNSON AND FRED FULTON INDEFINITELY SUSPENDED

Boston, April 18.—Floyd Johnson and Fred Fulton, the boxers, who are to meet at Jersey City next Monday night were suspended indefinitely in the state of Massachusetts by the boxing commission today.

The commission said that the men had failed to carry out an agreement to box for the Arena A. C. in this city last Monday, and based its judgment on telegraphic and written exchanges that were produced by the club as evidence.

French Show Germany Ignorant "Big Bertha" Shots Hit Mark In War

Paris, April 18.—Answering Leon Daudet's article in Tuesday's Action Francaise, in which he advanced the theory that the famous "Big Bertha" was not a long range cannon, but an "electric gun" hidden in the outskirts of the French capital, the Echo Nationale published an official German report concerning the mysterious cannon.

That lengthy document, which is said to have fallen into the hands of the French in their advance in the late summer of 1918, reveals the fact that the Germans did not know the "Bertha's" shells were finding their mark into Paris, and were informed by an official French communiqué.

General Ludendorff, in the spring of 1918, ordered a gun to be manufactured with a range of sixty miles. After the work had progressed nine months Ludendorff decided that the gun's range must be increased to 75 miles on account of the retreat along the Siegfried line having been decided upon.

Report Fields Two Feet Thick Around Mackinac Island.

ERIE IS CLEARING

Detroit River and Lake St. Clair Are Now Free of Floes.

Sarnia, April 18.—According to a report received by the Northern Navigation Company yesterday the prevalence of ice far down in Lake Huron, with ice fields reported at Harbor Beach, indicates that navigation to the head of the lakes will be delayed several days. The ice in Duluth-Superior harbor ranges from 17 to 19 inches, but the top is thawing somewhat. The field ice in the lake extends out about 15 miles beyond Two Harbors, and the fields are now shifting with the winds.

At Port Arthur the channel is kept open from the harbor to open water by the ice breakers, the Chequamegon Bay continues solid and the fields are moving in and out of Ontonagon.
