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EAST MIDDLESEX
LIBERALS AWAIT
CALL TO BATTLE

Enthusiastic Committee Meet-
ing Develops Into Regular
Party Convention.

SHOW FINE REPORT
Invited to Rally in Two
Weeks.

Confident that the day of political
deliverance is at hand, the Liberals
have gone forth to battle in the east
riding of Middlesex. The party nomi-
nating convention has been set for
Saturday, May 12, in Hyman Hall, at
2 o'clock in the afternoon.

A special meeting of the executive
committee of the East Middlesex
Liberal Association staged Saturday
afternoon developed into a convention.
While none were expected to attend
but the four or five members of the
board, more than 20 delegates ar-
rived at the appointed hour, indicat-
ing that the smoldering flames of Lib-
eralism have been rekindled and a
steady flame burns from one end of
the constituency to the other.

The annexed districts were particu-
larly well represented and glowing
reports were submitted from the
greater number of polling districts in
the riding.

Will Get Speakers.
Aroused by the numbers and en-
thusiasm of Saturday's meeting, party
organizers propose to bring promi-
nent members of the Legislature to
address the convention two weeks
later. A special effort will be made
to induce R. L. Brackin, the popular
Liberal representative from Chatham,
while Hartley Dewar will also be in-
vited to share in the opening engage-
ment.

Election of officers will not be held
at the convention, the entire after-
noon to be devoted toward addresses
from the visitors, and leading Lib-
erals of the riding.

Names of several prospective candi-
dates were submitted, all of whom
will be given an opportunity at the
scheduled gathering, which will be
held at the Hyman Hall, residents of
East Middlesex and professed Lib-
erals.

Westminster Township, and former-
ly warden of Middlesex; E. W. Chap-
man, East London; Col. Bart Robson,
Iderton; Dr. G. A. Routledge, Lam-
beth; Dr. Ross, Hanksin, London; and

any one of these prospects would
prove an ideal candidate, and it is as-
sured already that one of the num-
ber will consent to bear the Liberal
banner in the heat of battle.

U.F.O. and Labor Breaks
Relations In Wellington

Farmers Sever Alliance With Independent Party of Guelph De-
spite "Gentleman's" Agreement Made In 1921.

Special To The Advertiser.
Guelph, April 30.—The political al-
liance which has existed between the
United Farmers of South Wellington
and the Independent Labor Party of
Guelph since prior to the last Do-
minion election was completely sev-
ered on Saturday afternoon when the
Farmers, after a lengthy session,
bluntly told a deputation of Labor
men that they intended to run a
U. F. O. candidate in the provincial
election, despite a "gentleman's agree-
ment" made in 1921 to the effect that
Labor support for a Farmer in the
Dominion contest would bring for its
reward U. F. O. endorsement of a
Labor man in the next Ontario fight.

No Other Course Open.
According to a statement to The
Advertiser by J. A. Cockburn, Presi-
dent of the South Wellington
U. F. O., the Farmers regretted
very much having to break up the
alliance, but in view of the over-
whelming desire on the part of
Farmers' clubs in all sections of the
riding to drop Labor completely, the
executive had no other course open.

The action of the Farmers, while not
altogether unexpected, came as a
keen disappointment to the Labor
men, who up to the last minute had
predicted that in the final analysis
the colleagues from the country would
realize that an agreement between
gentlemen was something that should
be kept.

During last week every effort was
made to heal the ever-widening
breach between the two parties and
on Friday night the Labor men were
told they would get a final answer on
Saturday afternoon when representa-
tives from all the Farmers' clubs in
the riding would hold a conference
in the banquet hall of the Royal
Canadian Cafe. Three o'clock was the
time set for the Labor deputation to
appear, but at that hour they were
told to return at 3:30. Again they
were told to come back at four and
finally they got into the meeting at
4:30.

If the time hung heavily on their
hands while awaiting for the jury to
arrive at its verdict, the Labor men
were not disappointed. President
Cockburn took time enough to extend
a warm welcome to them, and then,
turning to U. F. O. Secretary J. J.
Mahon, he asked that official to speak.

Short and Blunt.
According to the Labor delegates
when seen after the meeting, Mr.
Mahon's speech was short and blunt.
He simply said he had a painful
duty to perform, and that was
to tell the Farmers of South Well-
ington intended to run a straight
U. F. O. candidate in the provincial
election, and that the conference was
unanimously of the opinion that they
could not concede to the wishes of
Labor to get behind an I. L. P. man.

Mr. Mahon stated the chief reason
for breaking the alliance was that
the Labor vote in Guelph for the U.
F. O. candidate in the Dominion con-
test had not been up to anticipation.

ANXIETY INCREASES
SUPPORTERS QUESTION DISPOSAL
OF FUNDS SENT TO GENERAL
DESKAHEH.
Brantford, April 30.—"Have nothing
to do with Colonel Andrew T. Thomp-
son or anyone else that the Canadian
Government appoints as a member of
a commission to adjust our differ-
ence with it. If you do, you lose all
chance for regaining your status as
an independent nation." Chief Gar-
low, who was one of a deputation of
five that visited Chief Deskaheh in
Rochester, made this statement at a
meeting of the Six Nations' Council
held at Oshkosh after the repre-
sentative of the Indian department
had left for dinner.

Brought Back Message.
He declared that this was the mes-
sage he had brought back from Des-
kaheh, and that the command not
only applied to the council but to
all his supporters. He would not con-
tinue his message, as the govern-
ment representative then returned,
but will do so next week. Col. Thomp-
son was appointed as the government
member of a commission asked by
the Indians to adjust their differ-
ences.

ART TREASURES IN CITY

Noted Artist In Water Colors
Faithfully Portrays Beauties
of Nature.

This city has received a great art
impetus in the last few years,
through many exhibitions and the
purchase by its citizens of many
beautiful works of art. One of the
best-known exhibitors is George
Chavignaud, who began to show his
pictures in London twenty years ago.
Last year he gave two art lectures
and painted a number of pictures
by the purchase of two of his
small pictures for the Normal School.
Although the artist was born in Brit-
tany, France, he has been here so
long that he is a Canadian by adop-
tion.

In looking over the few pictures
Mr. Chavignaud has brought this
year to the city one is at once com-
pelled to realize that they are a col-
lection of nature's impressions, the
work of one who must love nature
greatly. The treatment is sincere in
the case of sketches assured, and
