THE ROCHESTER HOLOCAUST

TWELVE MORE BODIES TAKEN FROM THE RUINS

of the Burned Building, Making Thirty-three in All - A Dozen More Still Among the Debris-Arrest of a Supposed Firebug.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 14.- Twelve nore bodies were unearthed about nine clock this morning in the ruins of last driday's great fire. This makes 33 dead accounted for. There are probably ten or twelve bodies yet in the ruins. The bodies were wedged together as though they were wedged together as though they had all been standing together when the floor gave way and precipitated them to the basement and into a raging furnace. Above the bodies was a huge piece of machinery When this had been lifted aside the full horror of the sight was laid bare. The first body taken out had the head burned off. Two hocks were then taken and placed in Two bodies were then taken and placed in one box. Of the one the trunk was all that was left, the limbs had been burned off. Another was without feet, the limbs drawn back as though the man had died in

great agony. Only four of these taken out to-day are recognizable. Jno.Vankorff, employed as engineer at the steam gauge and lantern works, was arrested last night on suspicion of setting fire to the works last Friday night. When charged with the crime Vankorff denied it. His record is not very good, and the police think he is the man, as he seems to have a mania for causing fires. for causing fires.
