BRAZILIAN CONGRESS.

RIO DE JANEIRO, May 7.—Congress opened to day with Dr. Prudente de Maroles, President of the Senate and President-elect of the Republic, in the chair. President Peixoto's speech to the members touched upon many questions relating to the insurrection. He said that he regarded the insurrection as squelched. The few bodies of insurgents still remaining defiant he described as weak and insignificant. The foreign relations of the country he said were satisfactory, although the Government still awaited Portugal's decision as to giving the conquered insurgent officers an asylum. The commercial outlook was good. The Government expected that commerce with the United States would develop rapidly. The treasury deficit was \$97,000,000.

BRIBERY AND CORRUPTION.

New York, May 7.—A special from St. Johns, Newfoundland, saye: Nine dollars a vote is what it cost Sir William Whiteway, the Hon. Robert Bond and their colleague, James Watson, to be elected for Trinity district last November, as revealed by the trial they are now undergoing for corrupt practices. They apent \$18,000 and received 2,000 votes. Washington, D. C., May 7.—The President has signed and promulgated the regulations to govern vessels employed in fur seal fishing during the closed season of 1894. seal fishing during the closed season of 1894.
They are:

"Article 1. Before the issuance of a special license the master of any sailing vessel proposing to engage in fur seal fishing shall produce satisfactory evidence to the collector of customs that the hunters employed by him are competent to use the weapons authorized by law.

"Article 2 Firearms, nets or explosives shall not be used for taking or killing fur seals in that portion of Behring sea described in the act approved April 6, 1894.

"Article 3. Any vessel having license to hunt far seals in the North Pacific and Behring Sea, east of 180 degrees longitude, shall before extering Behring Sea or at Unaleska report to the customs officer of the United States navy and have all arms and ammunition on board secured under seal, and such seals within the area of order to protect vessels within the area of order to protect vessels within the area of the coast of Siberia, where seal shing sells of the coast of Siberia, where seal shing sells being will be permitted by vessels of the United States, the limit being fired at ten miles. The treaty was sent to the Senate to day while it was in executive session, and the only definite action taken on it was to refer it to the committee on foreign relations. Senator Morgan took occasion to briefly explain the document, saying that this was the first fruits of the efforts of the United States and Great Britain to get other nations to co-operate with them in the effort to preserve seal life. There is also an effort to bring Japan into the compact, but no such progress has been made in the negotiations as that with Russia. The document provides for penalties for its violation.
