A petition was received from a large number of property owners who wish the fire limits reduced in order to permit of the erection of wooden buildings on lots where the putting up of a brick structure would not pay the owners, owing to the high cost of the bricks from the thickly-built business districts. The council was divided in sentiment on the subject of the petition, and the petition was referred to the fire wardens for report.
