FATAL ACCIDENT AT WHITEHORSE MINE

Princess May Brings Details of
How W. P. Grainger and Gil-
bert Joyce Were Killed

Further advice regarding the ac-
cident at the Copper King mine, near
Whitehorse, Y.T., whereby William P.
Grainger and Gilbert Joyce, both well
known here, lost their lives, were re-
ceived by the C. P. R. steamer Prince-
cess May, which returned yesterday
from the north. The men were killed
by black damp in the southwestern
end of the Copper King mine, about
four miles from Whitehorse. The
circumstances, as related by the
Whitehorse Star, were as follows:

For some days previous to yesterday
a fire had been in the shaft in which
work had been done for several
years, for the purpose of thawing out
a thick coating of ice which encased
the sides for the purpose of putting
it in condition for inspection by Min-
ing Expert W. H. Wiley, who is here
from the Pennsylvania carbonate white-
lately bonded the property at a good
price, a fair cash payment having al-
ready been made to Mr. Grainger. At
between 11.30 and 12 o'clock on May
3 Grainger and Joyce left the mess-
house for the purpose of investigating
the results of the fire which had been
kept going in the shaft for a few days
previous to the arrival of Mr. Wiley.
The shaft, which was about 100 feet
deep, was reached by a rope ladder.
The shaft was about 100 feet deep,
and a few feet when he scented the
fumes. He immediately re-
traced his steps and gave the alarm.
One of the men was hurriedly sent
to a doctor and others to the camp
to the number of a dozen or fifteen,
went to work at pumping the gas from
the shaft. It was not until 2 o'clock
that the shaft could be entered. The
body of Joyce was found lying in the bot-
tom of the shaft, while the body of
Grainger was near the foot of the lad-
der, to which he was clinging with a
death grip.

By means of ropes and willing
hands the bodies were quickly hoisted
to the surface. By this time Dr. Pare
was on the ground but 45 minutes of
most strenuous work and application of
remedies known to medical science
and science failed to revive the inani-
mate bodies.

In the meantime the news of the
accident had reached town and it was
a sad and mournful crowd that met
the wagon which bore the bodies at
4.30 o'clock. They were taken to their
respective homes, where the cause of
death was officially re-
investigated to Dr. Pare, Royal N. W.
M. P. The body of each man was
sent to the morgue, and the bodies of
both of Grainger's ribs were
broken, indicating that the gas over-
came them while on the ladder. The

them is supposed to have sufficed
to cause Grainger's death. The body
of Joyce was found in a position
to attempt to start back up the ladder
before being finally overcome.

Gilbert Joyce, not a young man, was
the unfortunate, then, leaves a wife and
beautiful baby girl, the latter being
six months old. Grainger, who was
about thirty years of age, leaves a wife
and three children, the youngest being
a baby girl, and came out on the
stage when she was in the hospital, and
heartrending news that made her a
widow and her baby an orphan. Mr.
Joyce had just returned from his
cozy little home in the western
part of the town. He went to work
at the Copper King mine, as he had
previous to his death. He was from
Newfoundland, to which place he re-
turned about 20 years ago, and was
living with his bride, now his widow,
at the time of his death. He is here and
employed at the Whitehorse shipyard.
He was 30 years of age.

William P. Grainger was born in
Kentucky from 45 to 50 years of age.
In 1899 Mr. Grainger acquired an inter-
est in the Copper King mine, and was
the original stakeholder. He was
drowned at Taku Arm while carry-
ing mail between Log Cabin and
Whitehorse. He was a man of great
energy and was well known in the
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UNFAVORABLE WEATHER AFFECTS EASTERN TRADE

Business and Collections Both
Slow—Increase in West-
ern Clearings

New York, May 17.—Bradstreet's to-
morrow will say: "The cold, late spring
affects Canadian retail trade, and is
reflected in the slower wholesale trade
collections. The slackness of re-
tail business gives less concern,
however, because manufacturers and
wholesalers are generally behind on
deliveries. A fair business is being
done on fall account, and prices are
firm. The wheat crop will be seeded
late, and a decrease in area is prob-
able. Uniformly good weather is a re-
quisite from now on.

Montreal reports farmers busy on
the land, and retail trade in Quebec
is affected thereby. The longshore
strike affects shipping.

Toronto reports retail trade light,
but fall trade is good. Western col-
lections are slow. In Manitoba farm-
ers are busy seeding. Collections drag,
and real estate speculation is reported
as attracting money.
