Treaty With Britain Dropped Because of Senate's

Paris, Feb. 11.-It was learned here today that the treaty of arbitration be-tween France and the United States, which was signed in Washington by Ambassador Jusserand and Secretary of State Root, follows closely the terms similar conventions already made by France with Great Britain, Italy, Spain and Holland, the only differ-ence being in the method of ratification by the American senate and the French parliament. The treaty provides for the submission of all questions and difficulties arising between the two powers to The Hague court of arbitration, which was established in 1899, with the exception of those matters which concern the vital interests, the independence or the honor of either country, as well as questions affecting the interests of other powers. 
