LAND OF MYSTERY

Discovery in Nigeria of "The Sacred Lake of Life"

News has been received from Southern Nigeria of a remarkable discovery just made by Mr. P. Amariy Talbot, a District Commissioner, of which it is known as the "Sacred Lake of Life," on which, according to popular belief, the existence of a hundred thousand people depends.

When, some months ago, Mr. Talbot returned from extensive travels in the known parts of Nigeria, he announced as one of the most interesting discoveries the finding of the "Lake of Life" in the Ghan country. This he visited after great difficulty, and in spite of the fact that porters and carriers refused to proceed to the dreaded spot. The scene about the lake, he said, was full of mystery and dread.

The surface of the water was absolutely still, and round about were ten-foot high bushes, bearing what looked like great tufts of creamy flowers. These, however, proved to be nests of tree frogs. The place was a sanctuary for all wild things, for no hunter would dare penetrate the bush to this fearsome place. Hither, the natives believed, came by night the ghosts of long dead Ekoi, to drift in dead companies, hopeless and wallowing over the surface of the water. On Mr. Talbot's return to Nigeria he found that the news of the discovery of the Lake of the Dead had brought to light the fact that another sheet of water to which mysterious powers were ascribed existed in the neighborhood of Iko-Obo, the chief town of the Ibibos, and one afternoon Mr. Talbot and Mr. Eakin, accompanied by Mrs. Talbot and her sister, set out to endeavor to locate it.

Hitherto the knowledge of the lake had been kept a jealously guarded secret from all Europeans, and not even the natives, with the exception of the high priests, had been allowed to approach the sacred water—the dwelling-place of the greatest deity of the race. Access to the lake was through a sacred grove so cunningly contrived that a stranger might pass within a few yards, yet never find the holy pool. Mr. Talbot and his party, guided to the spot, found that the water was full of great fish, on the welfare of which depended the life of the Ibibbo race. The fish were so tame that they fed from the hand of the reigning high priest, the only native human being allowed to look upon the water. Formerly many victims were annually sacrificed here, though at the present day human life was not permitted to be taken.

Countless legends had grown up round the spot. It was said to be placed by its first guardian, the Thunder God, under the care of a python and a leopard, who ceaselessly kept watch and ward, and destroyed anyone rash enough to seek to penetrate its mysteries. It is especially sacred as the dwelling-place of the most powerful deity—the Great Mother—whose symbol is a holy rock facing the entrance. Near by the travellers found a second pool, similar to the lake itself. In the centre of this is a palm tree, near which, in the water, are stationed a man, a girl, and a boy, who bear the name of the goddess, as they were granted to the parents in direct answer to prayer.

A couple of clever swindlers victimized several fashionable hotels at Vienna. It appears that a well-dressed man was in the habit of frequenting the hotel lounges, apparently waiting for a friend. Soon after his arrival, in would come a very poorly dressed woman and appeal to the gentleman, to whom she was to all appearances a total stranger.

She would tell a pathetic story of privation and suffering, and the benevolent hearer would draw the other guests' attention to her case and start a collection for the woman, placing a piece of gold in his opera hat. Soon a substantial sum would be obtained and handed over to the woman, who would depart with tears of gratitude. The gentleman would later leave the hotel.

But the game was played once too often. A visitor who had seen a similar performance enacted some time previously at another hotel at which he had been staying recognized the well-dressed stranger and gave information.

The stranger was followed, and was found in the street sharing the money with the woman. They were arrested and identified as a married couple, who spent their time travelling from town to town all over Europe in order to carry on their operations.—Central News.
