Pretty Towns in Rock Bound

Coast Lure Summer

Tourists

A visit to the Gaspe Coast is a tonic
for both body and mind. The invigor-
ating sea breezes, that hit one a kindly
greeting, the healthy fare that is so
abundantly provided by the harvest of
the land and sea, and the warm sym-
pathetic nature of the people, all tend
to uplift the spirits and to build up the
body and soul of those who visit this
pretty and historic part of the Cana-
dian coast.

The eye could dwell on no grander
scenery than the lovely Metapedia Val-
ley, the forests, in all their fullness of
foliage, the fertile lands, and the swift
flowing rivers being convincing proof
of the wealth of this portion of Que-
bec. When Carleton is reached the
blue expanse of water of the Bay of
Chaleur dawns on the eye and brings
the thought, which afterwards is fully
justified, that here is a haven of rest
and pure enjoyment.

Along the coast are many pretty lit-
tle towns that are well worth more
than a hurried visit. The people are
a mixture of the real French-Cana-
dian; the descendants of the old Hug-
uenots of France, who emigrated to
the Channel Islands, and afterwards
came and settled on this coast line;
and English-speaking Canadians, many
of them descendants of Empire Loy-
alist families. They are principally
engaged in fishing and farming, and in
both respects nature seems to bestow
her favors with a lavish hand. Sal-
mon, cod, mackerel and lobsters are in
abundance in the Bay of Chaleur, and
the Gulf of St. Lawrence, while the
crops this season, especially hay and
potatoes, are better than for many
years.

New Carlisle, Paspebiac, Port Daniel
and Cape Cove are pretty little towns,
with lovely beaches, where salt water
bathing can be indulged in to the
heart's content. Perce, where the fam-
ous pierced rock stands close to the
shore, is a historical spot with a most
invigorating air. The hotel accommo-
dation at Perce, as at Gaspe, further
along the coast, is of an excellent na-
ture, and every effort is made to please
visitors, and to entice them back again.
A visit to the last mentioned would
not be complete without a sail across
the bay to the Peninsula. It is only
three miles across and makes a de-
lightful trip.
