—J. R. Green, the English historian, is

dangerously ill.

—The debt of New York on February 28

was \$90,885,796 89.

—Bartley Campbell won \$7000 in the re-

cent walking match, betting on Hazel.

—Campanini is the owner of the black-

smith shop in which he was once a laborer.

—Monsignor Thomas J. Capa, the dis-

tinguished Roman Catholic theologian of

England, is soon to visit this country.

—The fact that projectiles weighing 340

kilograms (750 pounds) left the Schneider

shield at Spa and damaged it, is held to

prove its superiority over the English shield.

—During the carnival at Rome the horses

got away in the race a little too soon, and

two people were killed and others injured.

The king and queen witnessed the cata-

strophes from opposite balconies.

—The death is announced, at the age of

95, of Admiral Loney, the "father" of the

British navy, who for the long period of

eighty-four or eighty-five years had been

connected with the naval service.

—The Japanese government has decided

that all criminals condemned to death dur-

ing the latter days of 1881, shall be re-

viewed, in order that their trials may be

reviewed by the judges, in accordance

with the new penal code which came into

force on Jan. 1.

—Accounts from Florence tell of carnival

scenes there even worse than those at

Naples. The papers head the report,

"Carnival of the Roughs." The lawless,

savage violence of the roughs rendered the

comer impossible, and the citizens fled to

their homes. The feeling is becoming ge-

neral that what is now called the carnival

must cease.

—Sarah Bernhardt was photographed

reclining in an ebony coffin padded with

white satin, promising at the time to die

within a year if the photographer would

agree to keep back the pictures that length

of time. Sarah having failed to keep her

part of the bargain, the photographer is now

before the courts to be allowed to sell the

pictures.

—Easter day fell on April 9 in 1871. It

will not, however, fall on this day again

after the present year till 1944; then again

in 1950, 2023, 2034, 2045, &c. In 1898 it

will fall on April 25, its latest possible date.

This will be the first time it has occurred

since the introduction of the new style in

1752. It will then not occur again on

April 25 until after an interval of fifty-seven

years, or in 1943; and then again for

one hundred and sixty-three years.

—The emperor of Brazil has been system-

atically visiting and examining the fac-

tories and workshops of Rio and its vicin-

ity, with the object of judging, by personal

investigation, and by hearing the views of

the proprietors and of experts, or the

claims put forward by manufacturers for

higher protective taxation of foreign pro-

ducts of a similar kind and of a reduction

of the import taxes on substances employed

in the Brazilian manufactures.

—The London Shipping Gazette, in a recent

leading article, cites the evidence of the

captain at an inquiry concerning the loss

of the Loch Awe as powerful testimony of

the value of oil in quieting the sea, and re-

fers to the similar experience of the Mon-

ter lifeboat crew, who made two careful

experiments. The Gazette says: "In the

case of fishing boats attached to nets on the

setting in of stormy weather, a gallon or

two of oil might prove the means of saving

boats, gear and crew."
