A heavy dealer in the city states that none of the Canadian exporters have realized any profits this season. "The fact is," said ho, "we are handicapped in England by the dairy men there. They are making far better choose than that made by Canadians, and this is the cause of our misfortune. The prices are low now but they will fall lower before the season closes. English dealers have given their representatives in Canada limits at which to buy cheese and if it cannot be got at the prices they name, which are away below last year's rates they don't want the Canadian cheese."
