NO DEMAND FOR LIST OF SALARIES

Mayor Fails To Carry Out Plan Rumored He Announced

SURPLUS IN WATERWORKS

Balance of \$10,000 Above Interest and Sinking Fund Reported

Although Mayor Wenige was present throughout the regular semi-monthly meeting of the Public Utilities Commission, held last night, and was given ample opportunity to carry out the announcement it is rumored he made, that he would demand publication of a complete list of salaries paid to the employees of the commission, the mayor said nothing.

Just why he failed to carry out his threat is as yet a mystery, for he was quoted in a local paper last night as being prepared to make his demand at the earliest opportunity.

A number of important questions were discussed at the meeting, among them being the matter of completing the removal of overhead wires in the city's downtown district. General Manager Buchanan announced that Manager King, of the street railway, had asked if the commission would permit him to remove all high tension feed wires to a back street. Mr. Buchanan recommended that this be allowed, with the understanding that as soon as the back street wires were placed underground street railway wires would also go.

"It doesn't matter, there'll be no street cars by that time," remarked the mayor.

ACTION DEFERRED.

The matter of street lighting was discussed, but action was deferred until the long-promised conference between the City Council and utilities commission can be held. Mayor Wenige stated that this had been arranged for and would be held in due time.

"We are ready at any time to meet you and discuss the project," advised Chairman Vinling, of the utilities commission.

Mr. Buchanan stated that the only solution of London's lighting troubles would be to double the lights on all streets.

BOARD OF HEALTH CUTS ESTIMATES

Cost To Be Nearly \$900 Below Last Year's Expenses

NO SALARY INCREASES

Dr. Downham Will Have To Pay Upkeep of His Auto

Cutting off all proposed salary increases and the amount set aside for the upkeep of Dr. Downham's car, the Board of Health last night slashed the estimates to nearly \$900 below those of last year.

The board's estimates for this year now stand at \$17,180, as compared with \$18,988 last year. Mayor Wenige insisted there should be no salary increases at this time. There are 3,000 citizens of London who have had no increase for a couple of years.

Another practice condemned by the mayor was that of providing free telephones for the board members.

"Why not provide them for the aldermen also?" he questioned. "When we are doing this thing we might as well do it right."

The board decided, however, that no phone under its jurisdiction could be eliminated to advantage.

The mayor also objected to the city paying for an assistant plumbing inspector to permit Inspector Young to take two weeks' holidays. It would be as reasonable to give every man working in the city two weeks' holidays on the same principle, he insisted.

The fertilizer plant problem was passed over to the Council for a settlement without discussion.

Chairman Douglas, Mayor Wenige and Dr. Downham were delegated to wait on the Utilities Commission to request some action to protect the Colville pond from surface water.

ASKS EXAMINATION BEFORE MARRIAGE

Stringent Laws to Prevent Desertion of Family Are Recommended.

A Dominion law providing for a physical and mental examination of all who intend to marry was recommended by Dr. H. W. Hill at a meeting of the London Social Service Council last night.

Special attention was drawn to the increased number of family desertions in London by T. D. McCullough, secretary of the council. He suggested more strict laws which would compel the husband to provide for his family.

He suggested many improvements for present social conditions, including: improvement of the law regarding family desertion; better care of defectives, the sub-normal and mentally deficient; social hygiene, advanced legislation on the matter of race track gambling; stabilizing of prohibition laws.

Mr. O'Connor announced between the second and third acts that the players would put on a new play a week and that on Monday and Thursday nights two tickets would be given for the price of one.


There would be a revival of old-time favorites, including East of Eden, but that painful release from New York would also be staged.
