Niagara Falls, July 17.—The Ottawa Customs authorities have sprung a surprise on persons crossing the lower bridge by placing a woman Customs inspector at the Canadian end of the bridge. Mrs. White, the woman Customs officer, has subjected the purchases of feminine shoppers to a rigid scrutiny, and it is said that she has already collected a tidy sum in duties. It is believed that this is only a temporary measure to curtail petty smuggling, which is alleged to have been extensively carried on.

EAST LAMBTON ENTRANCE RESULTS

Fred Winnett of the Oil Springs Public School heads the list in the Inspectorate obtaining 550 marks out of a possible 650, being about 85%. Of 240 pupils wrote in the Jr. H. S. Entrance examination in East Lambton and 142 were successful. The number writing this year is somewhat less than usual owing to the fact that some 25 boys availed themselves of the special regulation exempting them from the examination on the ground of employment on a farm. Their applications for certificates will be forwarded to the Department when they have completed their term of service which will probably be about Sept. 1st.

To pass requires a total of 60%, as well as 40% in each subject, while those who obtained 75% or over of the total have passed with honors. Names are in order of merit in each centre.

Some Raspberry Recipes

RASPBERRY CROWN
2 Tablespoons water, 2 tablespoons corn starch, 1 cup boiling raspberry juice, 1 egg, pinch of salt, lemon extract. Cook until creamy. Put into moulds. When cold serve with raspberries or whipped cream.

RASPBERRY TAPIOCA
Put 1/2 cup tapioca into a kettle, cover with 4 cups boiling water and cook until transparent. Stir into this 1 pint of raspberries, adding sugar to taste. Pour into a mould. Serve cold with cream.

RASPBERRY CAKE
1 Cup white sugar, 1/2 cup butter, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons buttermilk, 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 teaspoon soda, nutmeg, 1 cup raspberries, (to be added last). Bake in layers.

RASPBERRY VINEGAR
Put 1 quart of raspberries into a suitable dish, pour over them a quart of good vinegar, let it stand 24 hours, then strain through a flannel bag and pour this liquor on another quart of berries; do this for 3 or 4 days successively and strain it; make it very sweet with loaf sugar; bottle and seal it.
