All indications point to higher priced potatoes. Values were ruinously low last season, and as a result farmers in both Canada and United States cut down on the acreage. In New Brunswick this reduction amounted to 25 per cent., and while less drastic in other sections, the decrease was considerable. Following this inauspicious beginning came a season of generally poor weather. In the western provinces crops are good, but in Ontario and Quebec, where the bulk of Canada's spuds are produced, but 75 per cent. of a normal crop is expected. The same is true of United States. Furthermore, blight is still reducing prospects in Ontario.
