Annapolis Items. Steamer Cleopatra made her first direct trip from here to Boston, on Saturday last, and had for cargo, 2700 lbs. of potatoes, 45 cases of eggs, 55 boxes of sundries, and other goods, which was added her 40th freight. She took 120 passengers from here, and a number from Digby.

At the annual meeting of St. Luke's Parish, the previous Wardens, viz., Dr. A. Robinson and W. M. DeBelle, were unanimously re-elected for the ensuing year.
