SCOTY ACT INSPECTOR'S REPORT
To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis County:
Gentlemen,—I beg to present the following report of my work as your inspector for enforcing the Canada Temperance Act during the year just closed:
My efforts have been directed large- ly toward the prevention of illicit im- portation of intoxicating liquors into our County, an evil which has devel-

oped in recent years to a considerable extent—particularly and on behalf of petty dealers, assuming false names.

I found the process of search warrant very efficacious, and used it freely against violators of the law. Of ly against violators of the law. Of one case I may be permitted to make especial mention. On October 26th last I caused a barrel of bottles of liquor to be seized at Middleton Railway Station and taken to the office of Stipendiary Legz. This barrel came from St. John, N. B., and was addressed to "Harry Drew" Port Made, upon due inquiry, my suspicions that on due inquiry, my suspicions that there was no "Harry Drew" at Port Wade were confirmed, and hence the opportunity for bringing an action against him was lost. I at once how-ever, proceeded to institute a suit

cessful, and my account herewith preented hows the net results.

while I have striven earnestly to eradicate the liquor evil, fully believing that the strong temperance sentiment of Councillors would support such proceeding quite irrespective of the financial results, yet I am pleased to be able to present at this time the smallest deficit in matters of account that has ever occurred during my long stewardship as your Inspector. as ever occurred the state of t The month of December past the new procedure under the Nova Scotia Temperance Act came into force, and the results to be obtained from the change will be awaited with much interest. > Following is a detailed description Originated with John McIntish, Dundea, Dundas Co., Ont. in 1756, the first tree remaining short stout, sometimes medium roundish, slightly ribbed; skin pale yellow, almost entirely covered with crimson, dark on sunny side and brighter on rest of fruit dots few, small, yellow, distinct but not conspicuous; cavity of medium depth and width; stem short, stout, sometimes medium narrow, almost smooth, medium depth; calyx partly open; flesh white and yellow, crisp, very tender, melting, juicy, sub-acid, sprightly with a peasant aromatic flavour; core of medium size. open; quality very good to best; has a strong aroma; season November to February, or later, and earlier in the season in the warmest parts of Canada; tree hardy, and a strong moderately upright
