"A notable example of the good work done by our noble lay-brothers in different religious communities of the Catholic Church is furnished by the late Brother Boisrame, O. M.I., who died in St. Boniface, March 23. For forty-eight years he had been attached to the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, for forty-four years he had been in mission work. He had served twenty-six years at the northwestern extremity of Great Slave Lake, and, for a time, at L' Ile a la Crosse, 900 miles northwest of St. Boniface, both missions appearing to us as if on the outskirts of
