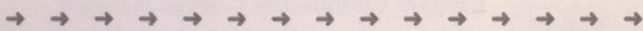
YPI participants from all pillars have represented Canada in 1,580 host organizations in 144 countries. As the world struggles with the changing nature of conflict, Canada offers an example of stability within a federalist framework with an increasingly heterogeneous population. Our youth offer an image of Canadians as talented, energetic, dynamic and willing to learn. Specific to the Identity pillar, over the past seven years the department has implemented 783 placements related to cultural industries and Canadian values, cultural media, distance and international education, indigenous issues, journalism, la Francophonie, multicultural/intercultural relations, museums, performing arts, film and television.

productions. It provided hands-on training in technical, marketing, production, distribution and networking aspects of the industry.



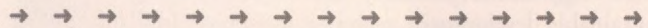

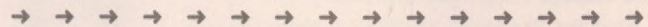
The Canadian National Institute for the Blind

blind youth with organizations in Europe, Africa and the Americas. Activities have focused on access technology and education.
