(A) INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATIONS AND AGREEMENTS

1. Exchange of notes between Canada and the United States recording Canada's permission to Pan American Airways Incorporated to fly into, through and away from Canada and to use the airport at Botwood (Newfoundland) in connection with the operation of its Atlantic services, September 1 and 2, 1944.
2. Exchange of notes between Canada and the United States recording Canada's permission to American Export Airlines Incorporated to fly into, through and away from Canada and to use the airports at Botwood and Gander Lake (Newfoundland) in connection with the operation of its Atlantic services, September 1 and 2, 1944.
3. Exchange of notes between Canada and the United States extending the agreement of November 10, 1941 for the temporary raising of the level of Lake St. Francis, August 31 and September 7, 1944.
4. Exchange of notes between Canada and the United States amending Canada's permission to Pan American Airways Incorporated to fly over Canada between Juneau (Alaska) and Seattle (Washington), August 29 and September 8, 1944.
5. Agreement between Canada, the United States and Newfoundland respecting security of information concerning matters of defence, signed at St. John's, Newfoundland, September 16, 1944.

(B) OFFICIAL STATEMENTS AND RELEASES
CONCERNING EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

1. Announcement of the composition of the Canadian delegation to the meeting of the Council of UNRRA in Montreal - press release of September 2, 1944.
2. Announcement that Mr. Pierre Dupuy would take up the post of Canadian Charge d'Affaires in Belgium, while Mr. Thomas A. Stone would assume the duties of Charge d'Affaires of the Legation to the Allied Governments still in the United Kingdom - press release of September 7, 1944.
3. Announcement concerning restrictions on civilian travel to liberated parts of Europe - press release of September 25, 1944.

(C) COMMONWEALTH AND FOREIGN GOVERNMENT
REPRESENTATIVES IN CANADA

1. On September 8, Dr. Wacław Babinski presented his letter of credence as Polish Minister to the Deputy Governor-General.
2. Mr. de Waal Meyer, the Accredited Representative of the Union of South Africa, left Ottawa on September 13, having been recalled for duty in South Africa.

(D) VISITS OF COMMONWEALTH AND FOREIGN
DIGNITARIES AND OFFICIALS

1. From September 11 to 16, meetings were held in the city of Quebec between the President of the United States and the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, who were accompanied by their military chiefs of staff. The Prime Minister of Canada gave an official reception on September 13. On the 16th, Mr. Churchill and Mr. Roosevelt held a press conference.
