

5. The cases of both offenders were dealt with on exactly the same principles. The facts and circumstances bearing on the gravity of the offences and the exercise of clemency in the two cases were very materially different.

PAY OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS.

*Mr. CASGRAIN:

1. Was an Order in Council passed in May, 1917, or at any time since, increasing the pay of the Medical Examiners under the Military Service Act?

2. If so, how much did they receive before the passing of the said Order in Council?

3. How much do said Medical Examiners receive at the present time?

4. Is the same rate paid to the said Examiners in all the provinces or in all Military Districts?

5. If not, what is the rate in each province or Military District?

Major General MEWBURN:

1. No Order in Council was passed authorizing an increase in the pay of Military Medical Examiners in May, 1917, nor since.

2. Answered by No. 1.

3. Military Medical Officers receive the pay and allowances of their rank. Civilian Medical Practitioners employed at mobilization centres under Military Service Act receive pay at: \$5 per day of 6 hours to 8 hours; \$8 per day of 8 hours or more. If away from their homes on duty, they receive \$8 per day irrespective of whether they work 8 hours or not.

1, 2 and 3. The C.G.S. Champlain was withdrawn for repairs on the 19th November and returned on the 23rd December, 1917. The vessel was replaced by the C.G.S. Bellechasse from the 19th to the 27th November, 1917.

WORK ON THE ST. CHARLES RIVER.

*Mr. CASGRAIN:

1. Has work upon the St. Charles River at Quebec been suspended?

2. If so, why?

3. How much has the said work cost to date?

4. If the work has been suspended, will it be resumed at a later date?

5. Have precautions been taken to protect and conserve the work so far completed?
