To do so, we as decision-makers must also experience this paradigm shift in thinking that our astronauts first experienced from outer space.

Our hope for the future is conditional on decisive action now, in fact yesterday, to begin managing our environmental resources, to ensure sustainable economic growth and human survival.

Our commitment must be defined in a new conceptual framework of a world that is rapidly approaching its limits to growth. Our policies must reflect the economic and environmental limitations which human society must learn to live with if it ever hopes to see the 22nd century.

To tackle this new reality we cannot afford to embrace any outmoded ideology, nor can we afford to pasture any sacred cows. We have to throw out old ideas and biases and look for solutions that work.

The necessity for open-mindedness and political flexibility has never been greater; the problems never more daunting, and the consequence of failure never more severe.

The challenge is before the House today. Do we have the courage to accept it?
