Dr. F. C. Harrison co-operation of all members of the department in the various matters you mention. I can see noinsuperable obstacle to consultation between members of a departmental staff at Macdonald and the Chairman of the Department at McGill, and indeed I feel that nothing but good could come of such consultation. Lectures, estimates and appropriations must all be dealt with in the last resort by the Faculty of Agriculture and its Dean, and so far as I can see this procedure will not differ materially from the present. The situation referred to in this paragraph occurs in other faculties without apparent ill results; in any case the practice is not new. Dr. Eve, for example, is on the Faculty of Medicine, but does not teach any medical students. (3) I cannot see that there are greater difficulties here than already exist in other cases at McGill and we seem to be able to surmount the obstacles. I cannot agree with your assumption that there is any degradation in regarding a professor at Macdonald as junior in his particular field to a professor at McGill who happens to be chairman of the department. I do not think that Dr. Snell, for example, need feel that his professional reputation will suffer by being placed in the same category as Dr. Whitby, Professor Maas or Professor Johnson, or Professor Quayle by being
