Take Up Homesteads In Northern Egypt

Five-Acre Farms on Drained Marshes Are Being Settled-Kitchener Introduces Law.

Lord Kitchener has introduced homestead law in Egypt.

The statement is enough to make the The statement is enough to make the reader gasp, but the explanation is very simple. In Northern Egypt are large tracts of marsh lands, interspersed by shallow lakes. The Egyptian government has begun the work of draining these marshes and useless lakes; and Lord Kitchener has opened a part of the land so reclaimed for homestead entry.

Each homestead contains five acres. The feliah, or peasant, who takes a homestead must give a portion of his time the first three years in further

time the first three years in further reclamation work. After that, he pays a moderate rent to the government for ten years, when the land becomes his for life. It may descend to his children, if government approves. It may not be mortgaged or sold without government consent.

A good many restrictions; but they are needed in dealing with Egyptian fellaheen. The Kitchener homestead edict is the most remarkable departure the Nile has witnessed for sixty centuries.

There have been plenty of enterpris-

ing Pharaohs who were ready to undertake any work that increased their revenues. But, in every case, the peasant was a mere tool, a laborer, a taxpayer, a creature who existed sole-ly for the use and pleasure of his lord the king. Kitchener is giving the peasant a chance. The statues of old Rameses would better be watched, lest they fall down in amazement at this unheard-of proceeding.

CLAY PRODUCTS WEALTH. Enormous Amounts Brick Tile an Pottery in United States. The clay-working industries of th

United States had in 1911 a production valued at \$162,236,181. according to the Valued at \$162.236,181. according to the United States Geological Survey, which has just issued a chart, compiled by Jefferson Middleton, showing the total output by states of all the different clay products. The total production of common brick was 8,-475,277,000, walued at \$49,885,262. Of this New Year contributed the largest this New Year contributed the largest amount, namely, 1.143.726.000, valued at \$5.918,286. Illinois was second in output, with 1.074,486.000, but the output, with 1,074,486,000, but the p oduct had the greater value of \$6,-126,911. No other state reached the billion mark, Pennsylvania coming third with 774,122,000 bricks. The chart gives the figures of production for other kinds of brick—vitrified brick, front brick, fire brick, etc.—as well as tawns cotts drain the general brick, front brick, fire brick, etc.—as well as terra cotta, drain tile, sewer pipe, stove lining and pottery products. The production of all kinds of bileks was more than 10,000,000,000.

In total production of clay products. Ohio leads the list, with a value of \$32,663,895. or one-fifth of the total for the United States: Pennsylvania is second, with \$20,270.033; New Jersey third, with \$18,178,228, and Illinois fourth, with \$18,333,011.

California, Oregon, Idaho, Washington and British Columbia grow a great part of the timber of North America. In all of these places there are fire wardens and fire rangers.
