Washington, Jan. 21 .- President Wilson issued a statement tonight characterizing as an "astonishing and unjustifiable distortion of the truth" assertions made by Senator Chamberin a speech at New York Saturday concerning inaction and inefficiency on the part of the government in

its war preparations. Investigations conducted at the capital, the president said, had brought to the foreground delays and disap-pointments and had contributed to them by drawing officials away from

'Nothing helpful or likely to speed or facilitate the war tasks of the gov-ernment has come out of such criticism and investigation," he added.

Legislation proposed by the senate litary committee for the creation of a war council and a minister of mu. ons, the president declared, had come after effective measures of reorganization already had been mature-

ly perfected.

The president said he regarded Secretary of War Baker, who was criticized by Senator Chamberlain, as one of the ablest public officials he had ever known, and that the country would soon learn whether he or his critics understood the business at

When Senator Chamberlain heard of the president's statement he made one in reply saying he had spoken ex-temporaneously at New York and that criticisms were directed only at military establishment, not at
