MANY WILL PASS TO HIGH SCHOOLS

Over Fifty Per Cent. Successful at Entrance Examinations.

Out of the 635 public school pupils who wrote for the high school entrance examinations last month, 352 were successful. This means that fifty-five and a half per cent. were successful, being the largest percentage since the rule of principals recommending pupils for the high schools was instituted. WILLS PROBATED

Thomas McLearn Connor, who died in Toronto June 27, left an estate valued at \$18,050, all of which goes to his widow, Margaret Ann Connor.

Two Toronto exemption tribunals met yesterday, one being presided over by Mr. Justice Masten and one by Mr. Justice Latchford. In all, 75 applications for exemption from military service were heard. Sixty-eight of the applications were granted, six refused and one exemption canceled.

LAKE OF THE WOODS TO HELP SEND FISH

According to information received at the office of the manager of the sales branch of the fisheries department, from George Rapsley, superintendent of fisheries in the Lake of the Woods district, about 1200 lbs. of fish, mostly white fish, from that lake would be available weekly for the Ontario market. Orders have been sent for one ton of the fish to be delivered to the Fort William and Port Arthur markets. Until now, those markets were supplied to a great extent from Lake Nipigon, but with the new supply available from the Lake of the Woods, the whole of the Nipigon Lake fish catch can be diverted to the local markets.

MAJ. BURCH PROMOTED IN CHAPLAIN SERVICE

Promotion of Major A. L. Burch to the post of principal chaplain of the Toronto military district is announced. He succeeds Lt.-Col. Geo. H. Williams, who has been appointed senior chaplain at Ottawa.

BEST OF ETCHINGS AT THE EXHIBITION

Will Be Most Complete Collection Ever Shown in Canada.

The Canadian National Exhibition Art Commission promises the most complete collection of etchings ever shown in Canada in the coming display in the Applied Arts Building. The most important collection will probably be that of the Chicago Society of Etchers with about 260 prints among many 20 centures, together with exhibits from Florence, Rome, Paris and London. The recently formed Canadian Etchers' Society will be well represented with about 100 prints from the presses of the leading etchers in Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto and Winnipeg.

Canadian and other illustrators will be adequately represented. The trustees of the National Gallery of Canada are loaning 20 of their most important lithographs by European artists and many original drawings by men whose names are familiar to art lovers the world over. From New York will come many pieces of decorative art recently shown at the Architectural League, the most notable being that by Arthur Crisp, which is about 10 feet by 15 feet. Another mural will be a circular painting for a new theatre in Toronto by F. S. Challener, R.C.A.

Exquisite samples of bookbinding, engraved addresses, heraldry for the great hall of Hart House, Toronto University, and examples of poster designing and artistic advertising in abundance will also be shown.
