



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SCARE AT WASHINGTON

Four Spanish Warships Reported to Have Run the Blockade

AND GOT INTO THE HARBOR OF HAVANA.

Later Report Affirms That They Were United States Ships—Troops Sent Forward From Tampa Were Held at Key West Until There Was Assurance That There Was No Danger—Bloody Fight Between Whites and Blacks at Tampa

WAR NEWS PARAPHRASED.

Manila, the Philippine capital, is reported to have fallen into the hands of the insurgents, and a Washington special to The New York Sun says complications ahead, if the report is true.

A report reached Key West that four Spanish warships had run the blockade and got into Havana harbor.

Foreign securities were depressed in London, through fear of a revolution in Spain.

Walter Bett, a clerk in the British Consulate at San Juan, Porto Rico, has been banished from the island, on the ground, as alleged, that he had given important information to the Americans.

Miss Wilberforce, of the British Red Cross Society, has been forcibly expelled from Havana because, as alleged, she refused to obey the Cuban Government's orders.

Twenty-seven thousand troops left Tampa, Fla., on Wednesday for Cuba. They got as far as Key West.

Just how long Santiago can stand besieging is a matter of conjecture. Three weeks ago it was claimed at Jamaica that the food in Santiago was very poor and that it was also very scant.

English Investors Urge the United States to Cede the Rich Islands.

London, June 9.—Whatever may be the policy of the United States towards the Philippine Islands, the English capitalists whose investments there give them the right to speak with authority upon the conditions and needs of the colony are of one mind.

A Washington special says: The success of Aguinaldo and his forces probably determines the question of permanent possession of the Philippines by the United States.

Washington Special: There seems to be no doubt now that General Coppinger is slated for the head of the expedition to Porto Rico.

A Key West special to The Herald says: There is no doubt that the supposed Spanish warships sighted off the northern coast of Cuba were part of our own fleet.

On Friday afternoon Lieut. Sharp of the Vixen, went to the place of rendezvous and received from the insurgents a map of the harbor, showing the entire Cape Verde fleet, with the exception of the destroyer Terror, inside, and close up to the city, under the protection of the guns mounted on Blanco battery, at the northern extremity of the harbor.

On Saturday last, when Commodore Schley found Admiral Cervera's fleet trying to leave the harbor and headed off the attempt, it has been the policy to surround the city and harbor that no assistance, either in supplying arms or ammunition, could reach there.

Santiago Reported Taken.

Cape Hayti, Hayti, June 9.—(8.40 p.m.)—A man who arrived here to-day in a schooner from Turk's Island, one of the Bahamas, and about 110 miles north of Hayti, said it was reported there on Tuesday that Santiago de Cuba had been taken by the Americans.

Carranza and Du Bose to Go.

Montreal, June 9.—(Special.)—La Patrie publishes the following despatch from Ottawa: "Major Sherwood, Chief of the Dominion Police, has left here for Montreal, his mission being to expel Messrs. Carranza and Du Bose from Canada."

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH DEPEW?

The Oratorical Railroad Magnate Says Uncle Sam's Heart is With France, Not England.

New York, June 9.—To-day's World has the following special cable: Paris, France, June 8.—The Matin prints to-day a long interview with Chancelier M. Depew of New York, in which he is quoted as speaking as follows of an Anglo-American alliance.

"The sympathy of republican France for monarchic Spain astonished us. But all continental Europe seemed at first hostile. One nation alone appeared to side with us—England.

"You know from experience the sensitive condition of a people engaged in war. The friendship of England aroused enthusiasm in us, and we were more grateful because for a century the relations of the Union with Great Britain has been rather strained.

"But these are the passing impressions of circumstances. We may arrive at an understanding with England on certain defined points, but from that to an alliance comparable to that between France and Russia or between Germany and Austria, there is an abyss, and that abyss we will never bridge—never," repeated Mr. Depew with emphasis.

"Our heart is not on that side. It goes out towards France, drawn by the glorious memories of our history, by community of democratic aspirations. The great republics cannot quarrel. On our side it cannot be, and neither, I am sure, on yours."

PROROGATION AT HAND

Legislators Will Wind Up Their Labors the End of This Week.

DRUMMOND RAILWAY DEBATE HELD OVER

Senate Amendments to the Franchise Bill Voted Down After a Somewhat Heated Debate—Manitoba Bill Went Through on a Straight Party Vote—Tariff Resolutions Considered in Committee of Supply.

Ottawa, June 9.—(Special.)—"I think it would be unwise to take the Spanish army at a disadvantage," said Mr. Foster this morning, in pleading that it would be unfair and unsatisfactory to debate the report of the Commission of Enquiry into the Drummond County Railway at the late hours of the session, and with Opposition members of the committee gone home.

"The Spanish army seems to be bottled up," said Sir Wilfrid, following up the bon mot as he decided to the acting Opposition leader's suggestion, and left the matter over for the session.

Mr. Foster, taking advantage of this evidence of complacency, asked for a statement as to when prorogation would take place. He promised to facilitate the much desired end in every way, and to oppose only the "worst" features of Government measures. He thought the members would prefer to spend Sunday free from their duties as Commons.

The Premier reciprocated the wish that members could thank God on Sunday that the end had come. He engaged to take up the remaining legislation to-day, and the estimates to-morrow, so that the House could prorogue Saturday.

The Franchise Bill.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell, with certain of his followers was in the gallery when the House considered the Franchise bill, which they sent to the committee.
