SERGT. JENKINS

Chief Williams in attendance. The charge laid by Charles Bowen, of Chicago, against P. C.'s Robinson and Thompson, for alleged assault on the night of Aug. 5, was filed, as the complainant did not appear.

Alexander McLean, an engineer, charged P. C. Downs with having struck him in the face with his baton on the night of the riots in East London, July 8, without cause.

Mr. Essery, counsel for complainant. asked that the matter be laid over until the next meeting as his client was unable to appear. The complainant will be notified to appear at the next meeting. A petition signed by about 200 prom-

inent citizens was before the board. asking for the reinstatement of Sergt. from Sergt. Jenkins to be taken on again.

The following motion was passed by the board: "The police commissioners have received a petition signed by many respectable persons, requesting the reinstatement of Sergt. Jenkins. There is evidently a misunderstanding on this subject, and a plain statement of facts is desirable, which is as follows: On July 13 last, Sergt. Jenkins tendered his resignation as sergeant and member of the London police force, and asked for payment of allowance due him out of the superannuation fund. The commissioners complied with his request, by accepting his resignation. Had Sergt. Jenkins previously made any complaint to the commissioners, they would have made inquiry; but no such complaint was made. The petitioners' ask for reinstatement, but Sergt. Jenkins, with his own free will, and without previous complaint, having se-

vered his connection with the force, we must decline to consider the case fur-The complaint laid by Charles Allan. charging P. C. Egelton with assaulting him on the night of Aug. 5, in front of the Hub restaurant, was laid over until the next meeting of the commissioners. Allan was unable to appear
