English Mine Disaster; Two Hundred Entombed

British Columbia Cause of Explosion Wrecks Great Colliery at Durham == Scores Trapped and Many Bodies Already Taken Out.

> Durham, Eng., Oct. 15.—An explosion occurred in the Wingate colliery near here at about midnight, resulting in some 200 men being entombed. About 100 of these are believed to be safe in a lower part of the colliery, but there were between 60 and 80 men in the seam where the disaster occurred. Up to 10 o'clock today ten bodies had been recovered, and every effort was being made to ascertain the fate of the remainder of the endangered miners.
