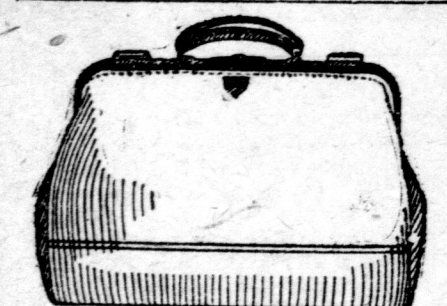

**CHANGES IN LOCAL
SUBDIVISIONS**

**The Growth of the City Makes
a Redistribution Impera-
tive Now.**

City Clerk Baker, at the inaugu-
ral meeting of the city council yesterday,
introduced a bylaw to change the
boundaries of certain polling subdivi-
sions of the city. Four new subdivi-
sions have been added, and the bound-
aries of several have been changed.

The municipal act provides that no
polling subdivision shall contain more
than 500 voters. Several in the city,
owing to the rapid growth of the
suburbs, have already many more than
that number, one division having 340
on the roll.

The changes made are as follows:
Ward Number One.
The northern boundary of subdivi-
sion 10 has been moved from Becher
street to Euclid avenue.

Subdivision No. 11, the old Tam-
many division, runs from Euclid to
Bruce, not Byron to Elmwood, as for-
merly.

The new subdivision lies between
Bruce street and Dufferin avenue.
The present No. 12 is unchanged, and
runs from Dufferin avenue to the city
limits.

Ward Number Two.
Subdivision No. 5 was too large, and
the block bounded by Albert and Kent,
Talbot and Ridout, is added to division
No. 3.

The block, St. George to Richmond,
and from Hymn street to Central
avenue, is taken from division 5 also,
and added to division 4.

Divisions 8 and 9 are divided into
three subdivisions.

No. 8 will be north of Blackfriars
and Oxford.

The new subdivision will be north of
Mount Pleasant and bounded by Alex-
andra and Surrey streets.

No. 9 will be south of Mount Pleas-
ant and bounded by Surrey and Alex-
andra streets.

Ward Number Three.
Divisions 5 and 6 were too large.
No. 5 will be decreased by the block
bounded by Hill street and Ottawa
avenue, and William and Waterloo
streets, taken from that division and
added to division No. 7.

No. 6 will be decreased by the block
William and Adelaide, and Grey and
Hill, being added to No. 8.

Divisions 10 and 13 are divided into
three subdivisions.

No. 10 will be north of Campbell and
Florence streets, Dundas, and east of
Rectory street.

No. 13 will be south of Van, Dame to
Pine, to the limits.
