

BIG ITALIAN STEAMER
SENT DOWN BY U-BOAT

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The big Italian steamship Milazzo, 11,477 tons gross register, was sunk during the early part of December by a German submarine, while the ship was in Mediterranean waters, according to word received in shipping circles here today. It is understood no lives were lost. The vessel was practically new, having been launched in 1916, and was owned by the Navigazione Generale Italiana. The Milazzo was 432 feet long, with a beam of 65 feet.

MANY CAPTIVES
AND CASUALTIES
HAIG'S REPORT

German Lines Entered at
Three Points Near
Ypres.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—On the fighting fronts the infantry is inactive, except for small raiding operations, but the artillery duels continue intense on various sectors.

In northern Italy snow has fallen to a depth of from three to five feet, bringing the operations to a halt. The movement of supplies to the enemy armies in the hills is being greatly impeded, and the indications at present are that fighting of great intensity will be impossible while the snow lies on the ground.

The official report from Field Marshal Haig's headquarters in France tonight says:

"Early this morning we successfully raided at three different points the enemy's trenches southeast of Ypres, inflicting many casualties and capturing many prisoners and two machine guns. The hostile artillery was active during the day south of Bullecourt, west of Lens and east of Ypres."

WANTS COMMISSION
TO SETTLE RACIAL
AND OTHER TROUBLES
MENACING CANADA

Quebec Chronicle Thinks the
Differences Can Thus
Be Solved.

Quebec, Jan. 11.—As a tentative solution of the racial problems which are threatening the unity of Canada at the present time, the Quebec Chronicle submitted this morning for the consideration of the press, parliament and people a scheme whereby the merits of the whole case may be partially investigated and fully established once for all.

"This solution," says the Chronicle, "is nothing more than a commission so constituted as to command unanimous acquiescence in its authority, competence and justice, which shall sit in the capital city of each province successively, taking evidence and receiving complaints from representative organizations on which to base a finding that shall not be merely one of law, but of absolute equity."

To this commission Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier should each nominate six members, three French and three English-Canadians, the individual members of each group to be representatives of law, religion and education, and the whole presided over as chairman by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, chief justice of the supreme court of Canada.

Chief justice Fitzpatrick states that no active politician or interested party, such as H. C. Hocken, M. P. for West Toronto, or Henri Bourassa or any member of parliament, shall be eligible to sit on this commission.

CONFERENCE CALLED
ON LABOR SHORTAGE
IN ALL PROVINCES

Needs of Farmers and Rail-
ways Will Be Laid Be-
fore Cabinet.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—The conference on labor shortage goes over to the 16th. To secure accurate information as to the actual needs, the departments of agriculture in each province are being invited to send representatives to Ottawa. The supply of farm labor will be particularly under consideration when the conference meets.

Railway needs were presented at a conference held at noon today between representatives of the railway companies and Hon. N. W. Rowell, railway requirements in regard especially to the supply of steel have been under consideration by the war cabinet for some time.

816 ABSENTEES ARE
NOTED IN MONTREAL
OF 2,522 CALLED UP

Returned Soldiers in Moose-
jaw Corral Thirteen From
Amusement Halls.

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—Out of 2,522 men called up under the M. S. A. here 816 men are reported as absentees, 377 from the city and 439 from the French battalion.

ROUNDING UP DELINQUENTS.
MOOSE JAW, Sask., Jan. 10.—A party of returned soldiers, under Sergeant-Major Adams and Sergeant-Major Morrison last night, shortly before midnight raided a number of pleasure resorts of the city and rounded up and took into custody thirteen young men, who were unable to satisfy the military authorities that they had complied with the provisions of the military service act. The delinquents were kept at police headquarters all night and removed to the army under guard this morning.

ELECTIONS FOR SPAIN.
Madrid, Jan. 11.—King Alfonso today signed a new decree dissolving the Cortes. Elections will be held February 24 and the new parliament will meet on March 18.

HEARST ANNOUNCES
ELECTION COMING IN
NEXT FEW MONTHS

Will Not Hold By-Election in
North Oxford on That
Account.

TORONTO, Jan. 10.—William Proudfoot, M.P.P., the new Liberal leader in the Ontario Legislature, today called upon Premier Hearst to ascertain whether the Government proposed bringing on a by-election in North Oxford to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Hon. Newton Rowell, president of the privy council, who represented North Oxford in the Legislature before joining the Union Government at Ottawa.

The premier assured Mr. Proudfoot that the Government did not intend holding a by-election in North Oxford, as it would entail the preparation of a special voters' list, which would not be worth while, in view of the fact that a general election is to be held in the course of a few months, probably next June.

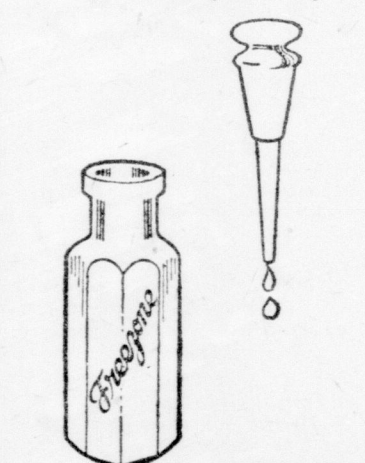

Brantford Will
Vigorously Oppose
Hydro Reduction

Think Discrimination Is Being
Shown by the Com-
mission.

BRANTFORD, Jan. 10.—The local hydro board has received orders from Toronto to cut down by 20 per cent its power consumption. This city is entitled to 2,600-horsepower, and is not receiving enough for all demands. The commissioners openly assert that there is something wrong with the hydro scheme, and attribute the recent order to discrimination towards other cities where new contracts for power are announced. Vigorous objection will be taken to the proposed reduction of the Brantford supply.

SITUATION IMPROVES.
STRATFORD, Jan. 10.—Considerable improvement in the local power situation was shown today, and there were no interruptions at all. It is expected the city will resume its normal supply with the exception of the street lights being off until 7 p.m.

The city is granted a maximum load of 1,350 kilowatts, and a minimum of 645 kilowatts. Stratford has never gone over 1,320 kilowatts, and it is expected that in this case there will be plenty of power to go around.

STANDARD LOAF URGED
UPON FOOD CONTROLLER

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—Mrs. Mulrow of the food control's office, Ottawa, told the food conservation committee of Montreal this afternoon that it had been suggested that there be one standard loaf for Canada.

Mr. Mossop, another member of the food control's staff, whose special work is visiting hotels and best restaurants, said he had found in Montreal that the public was discouraging the efforts of the proprietors to live up to the law, by pretending to them that their competitors were not doing so.

SIX MILLION WOMEN
OF UNITED KINGDOM
ARE GIVEN THE VOTE

Suffrage Measure Approved by
the Lords—Christobel Is
Pleased.

LONDON, Jan. 11.—The morning newspapers welcome heartily the decision of the House of Lords on woman suffrage, which gives the vote to about six million women and ends the long struggle which has troubled the country for years. It is true that the third reading of the bill is yet to be taken, and a motion to submit the question to a referendum is to be disposed of, but it is not believed that this has any prospects of success even if left to a vote.

Mrs. Millicent C. Fawcett, a veteran champion of the woman suffrage movement, and who has worked tirelessly for its success, said:

"I don't say that everybody will be satisfied, but I think we will get the best when occasion arises. We certainly don't think of rushing in to ask for more immediately."

Mrs. Christobel Pankhurst said: "The vote will be used for the national good, first, for promoting social reform, second, for stimulating national defence, and, third, for disciplining democracy."

Mrs. Pankhurst added that the women of Great Britain now had only one idea, namely, to assure victory for the Allies.

MEAT SITUATION IN
ENGLAND IS RELIEVED

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The meat situation, which has been so acute during the last week, was greatly improved today. Large consignments of beef and mutton reached Smithfield last night, and all retailers applying received supplies this morning.

ITALY IS DELIGHTED
WITH WILSON'S WORDS

Speech Creates Greater Interest Than
Pope's Message.

Rome, Jan. 11.—The text of President Wilson's address before the American Congress reached here about midnight on Wednesday. Senators and deputies who sat huddled in the senate chamber read the dispatches eagerly, and had words of satisfaction for the president's constructive statement of the situation. A prominent statesman remarked that President Wilson had been able to complete the idealization of the program set forth by Premier Lloyd George, by outlining an arrangement for a new society of the civilized nations of the world. Another said that the president's message had created greater interest than the pope's peace message last August.

BATTALION COMMANDER
CHARGED WITH FORGERY

QUEBEC, Jan. 10.—Lieut.-Col. O. Readman, former commander of the Quebec Trenchers, was today bound over to the grand jury to undergo trial at the next term of the court regarding the forgery of 153 charges of forgery, false pretence, etc., involving in all the sum of \$4,000.

GOVT. NOT SPONSOR FOR
IMPORTATION OF CHINESE

Prof. Creelman Only Seeking to Bring
Out Discussion.

TORONTO, Jan. 10.—Mention which was made by Dr. Creelman, commissioner of agriculture for Ontario, in Quebec recently regarding the possible importation of Chinese labor for the farms of Canada must not be taken as having come from the Government, according to information received at the Parliament Buildings today. The commissioner only made the suggestion to bring out discussion on the subject, it was stated.

BANKER FOUND DEAD

CANADIAN, Jan. 11.—C. V. Ketchum, for over 26 years manager of the Bank of Toronto here, was found dead in bed at his home here this morning. He was a son of the late Judge Ketchum of Cobourg.
