The garbage collectors, 31 in number. declare that if the city council does not raise their wages to \$3 a day when it considers their case tonight, they will not go to work tomorrow.

The men, 29 of whom are married, declare that they cannot live and barely clare that they cannot live and barely exist on \$2.85 a day. They point to the fact that the majority of the cellectors have large families, their rents are constantly increasing with the other necessities of dife, and also point to the fact that the Government estimates that it costs about \$18.30 a week to feed a family of five, pay rent and fuel, with the clothing in addition to be provided for.

Of the collectors, 29 are married and two are single. All the married men have children, one or two of them one.

In all, the families of the 29 men total 137 members, or an average of 4% each. This is exactly 100 meals a week which each man is called on to provide. They also claim that their rents have increased, and it is the men with the biggest families who have the higher rent, as they have to have the larger house. One of the men with eight in his family pays the highest rafte, \$16.50. The lowest is \$10, and the average rent paid by the 29 collectors is \$12.50.


