HEALTH INSTITUTE WORK PROVED AN EYE-OPENER TO MEMBERS OF BOARD

City Gets Valuable Service and Pays Nothing for It.

Members of the board of health paid a visit to the London Institute of Public Health this morning with a view of getting a line on the amount of work which the institute carries on for the city.

Since Dr. Hill resigned as head of the institute and M. O. H. the city's allowance to the institute has been stopped. However, there has been a considerable amount of work done.

Chairman Russell stated after the inspection that the amount of work of great importance carried on for the city was an eye-opener to him. He said that his conclusion was that the city derived a wonderful benefit from the institute without paying anything for it. There were also suggestions put forward to centralize the work of the different public nurses that they might avoid overlapping. This matter will be gone into later. It is possible that the board of education nurses may be asked to co-operate in this work.

The board of health, at its next meeting, will decide as to whether it will continue the arrangement to have the head of the institute act as M. O. H. A new head has not been secured for the institute, but undoubtedly when he is appointed he will also be tendered the health work of the city also.

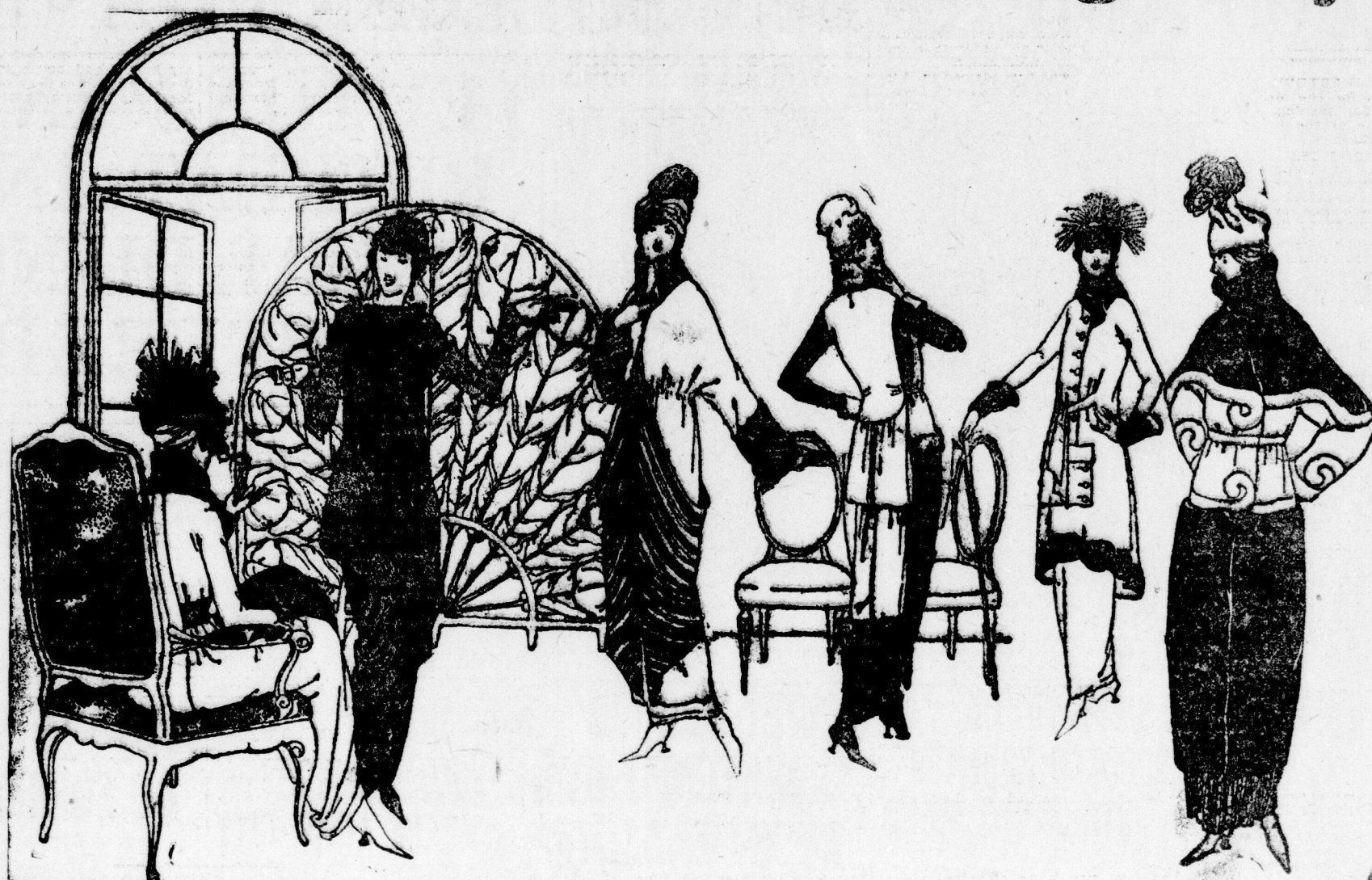
