Lloyd George's Supporters Are Confident That He Will Return To Power With Safe Majority

Coalition Government Expects 435 Seats, While 272 Are RHINELAND MAY Conceded to the Opposition-Women Have Taken a Great Part in the Electioneering - Christabol Pankhurst Promises Great Things If Women Rule.

London, Dec. 14.—(Canadian Press.)
—Bailoting for the election of parliament members is in progress throughout Great Britain today. Indications are that Premier Lloyd George will control a safe majority. The Daily Express estimates that his Government will win 435 seats (the Unionists 210 and the Liberals 125), while the Opposition parties, including Labor, will secure 272, giving the prime minister a majority of 163.

Women have been active in the electioneering. There is intense rivalry between Mrs. Lloyd George and Mrs. McKenna, wife of the former chancellor of the exchequer, who is a staunch supporter of former Premier Asquith. Supporters of Premier Lloyd George have conducted a vigorous campaign in South Wales, violently attacking McKenna in reply, criticizing the prime minister.

Miss Elizabeth Asquith admitted in some of her speeches that the electors sometimes made candid remarks about her father, but, she added, "he does not mind." Bonar Law's daughter at Glasgow also took part in the campaign.

Miss Christabel Pankhurst, the noted suffragette, promised the voters that when the women's regime prevails in parliament every house, no matter down small, will be lighted, heated and served by electricity.

Copenhagen, Friday, Dec. 13.—(By the Associated Press). The German armistice has been extended until 5 o'clock of the morning of January 17, according to a dispatch from Treves, where the delegates of the various countries have been in conference. This prolongation, it is added, will be extended until the conclusion of a preliminary peace, subject to the consent of the Allied governments.

The German Government has not yet a definite date for elections for a constituent or national assembly. Unofficial reports have said they might be held early in February.

## SALVOS OF ARTILLERY GREET U.S. PRESIDENT ON ENTRANCE TO PARIS

President Poincare, On Behalf of French Republic, Warmly Greets Head Executive of Great American Nation.

President Poincare greeted President Wilson warmly as the latter stepped from the train. William Martin, who is attached to the foreign office as introducer of ambassadors, presented Premier Clemenceau, who welcomed President Wilson in English, saying he was extremely glad to meet him.

The formalities of the greeting over the president entered a carriage with President Poincare. Mrs. Wilson, with Miss Margaret Wilson, daughter f the president, followed in another carriage, accompanied by Mme. Poincare. The party drove immediately to the residence of Prince Murat in the Rue De Monceau, where the president will reside while in the French capital The reside while in the French capital.
