

King Urges Brief Cessation of Work on Armistice Day

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The King, in a proclamation to his subjects today, appealed to them to join him in celebrating the anniversary of Armistice Day, November 11, by a suspension at 11 o'clock of all normal activities for a brief space of two minutes. The event, "which stayed the carnage and marked the victory of right and freedom," should thus be commemorated so that "the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated upon reverent remembrance of the glorious dead."

His majesty expressed the belief that all will gladly unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

SILENCE TO REIGN OVER EMPIRE FOR TWO MINUTES ON ARMISTICE DAY

Message From King to Governor-General Calls for Observance of Event.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.—A complete suspension of all normal activities for a period of two minutes on Tuesday, November 11, the first anniversary of Armistice Day, is the desire of His Majesty King George, as expressed in a cable from Lord Milner, secretary of state for the colonies, to his excellency the governor-general. The message, which was read in the House of Commons tonight by Sir George Foster, acting prime minister, follows:

"London, Nov. 6.—I am commanded by His Majesty the King to send you for immediate publication the following message, which is addressed to all the peoples of the empire:

"To all my people: Tuesday next, November 11, is the first anniversary of the armistice, which stayed the world-wide carnage of the four preceding years, and marked the victory of right and freedom. I believe that my people in every part of the empire fervently wish to perpetuate the memory of that great deliverance, and of those who laid down their lives to achieve it.

"To afford an opportunity for the universal expression of this feeling it is my desire and hope that at the hour when the armistice came into force,

the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, there may be for the brief space of two minutes a complete suspension of all our normal activities. During that time, except in the rare cases where this might be impracticable, all work, all sound, and all locomotion should cease, so that in perfect stillness the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead.

No elaborate organization appears to be necessary. At a given signal which can easily be arranged to suit the circumstances of each locality, I believe that we shall all gladly interrupt our business and pleasure, whatever it may be, and unite in this simple service of silence and remembrance.

"This will be published in the press here tomorrow morning. Arrangements are being made for the general observance of the two minutes' silence at 11 o'clock next Tuesday. Trains will be stopped on the railways, traffic on the streets, ships as far as possible at sea, and every effort will be made to get work suspended everywhere in schools, shops, mines and factories and to insure complete silence.

"His majesty hopes that your ministers may be willing to arrange for a similar observance.

"It is, of course, impracticable, owing to distance, that the ceremony should synchronize throughout the Empire. It is, therefore, suggested that at 11 a.m., local time, should be adopted everywhere.

"Similar messages being sent to India and to every dominion and colony in the Empire.

JEW IS FINED \$200 FOR KEEPING WINE FOR SANCTIFICATION

Magistrate Sympathizes, But Has No Discretion Under the O. T. A.

LINDSAY, Ont., Nov. 6.—The first case brought by the Ontario License Board against a Hebrew for having "home-made" wine in his possession was that of the crown against a Lindsay man named Applebaum, tried here today. The defendant was convicted and fined notwithstanding that Rabbi Jacob Gordon of Toronto was a witness in his behalf. Applebaum runs a junk shop and has a license in connection with the shop. When a "spotter" for the license board, named Lewis, walked in he saw a bottle which the defendant said was not hidden from view and which he had admitted to Lewis contained home-made wine that was being used for religious purposes. Rabbi Jacob Gordon of Toronto gave evidence to show that according to the Law of Moses, which was the Jewish law, good Hebrews had to have "old pure" wine for sanctification purposes on Saturdays and Sundays and particularly during the Passover. He admitted that in Toronto wine for such purposes was as old as seven years and consequently 35 per cent alcohol; also that for the last Passover he had secured an order from Chairman Flavell to use "pure" wine.

No Substitute. If a Jew were poor and could not buy wine he must even sell his garment to secure the wine, the rabbi said. There should be no substitute, not even watered wine, unless the "old pure" wine could not be secured. The prosecuting lawyer admitted that in his opinion Applebaum was innocent of any intent to break the law. The defendant's lawyer said Applebaum was simply living up to his Jewish belief, and could not see why he had been singled out for prosecution any more than the number of any other religious denomination partaking of the sacrament at which wine was used. The magistrate said Applebaum, who was simply living up to his religious belief, but the act was explicit and he could not do otherwise than fine him the minimum of \$200 and costs. He intimated that the defendant might put in an appeal to the Ontario License Board for a remission of the fine.

U. S. MINERS FILE A MOTION TO DISSOLVE RESTRAINING ORDER

Motion Alleges That To Strike Is Not Unlawful—Hearing Saturday.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 6.—A motion to dissolve the order restraining officials of the United Mine Workers of America from encouraging or directing the strike of 405,000 members of the union was filed in the United States district court here this afternoon by attorneys for the miners. The restraining order was issued last Friday, and the hearing on a temporary injunction, petitioned for by the Government, will be next Saturday.

The motion says the exigencies of the war have "ceased progressively," and points out that the complaint does not allege that the common lot of miners will not be improved by a new wage agreement.

It alleges that it is not unlawful to strike, and cites the acts of 1914 as providing that no restraining order shall be issued in the common lot of miners in any case between employers and employees, "growing out of a dispute concerning terms or conditions of employment, unless necessary to prevent irreparable injury to property or to a property right, which there is no adequate remedy in law."

RETAIL MERCHANTS SAY ARBITRARY PRICE REDUCTION NO GOOD

Law of Supply and Demand Must Govern, They Declare.

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.—Representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada, who met the board of commerce this morning, held that there was no profiteering among the retailers; that they were prepared to do all in their power to assist the board in their effort to relieve present conditions, and that in their opinion the lowering of prices arbitrarily would not help, but would make matters worse.

E. M. Brown, executive of the Dominion Merchants, said the retailers no longer wanted to be branded as thieves and scoundrels. It was no good, he insisted, to try to fool the public longer about a reduction in the cost of living only come down in the natural order. The retailers had been trying to get the board of commerce to meet the board of directors in the public mind. He held that per cent of the people did not know what they were prepared to do when they insisted that prices should be arbitrarily lowered.

The two vital things affecting the cost of living were supply and demand. The board of commerce could not pull down prices; they would have to come down in the natural order. 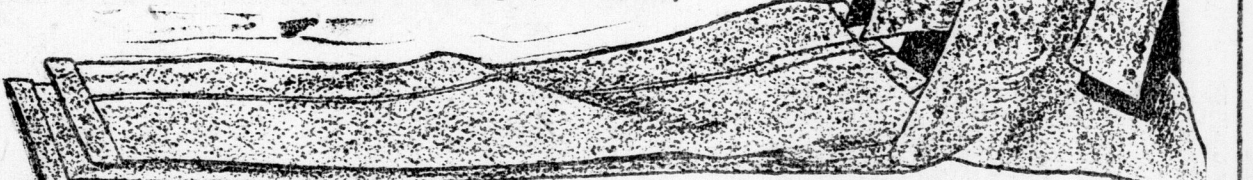

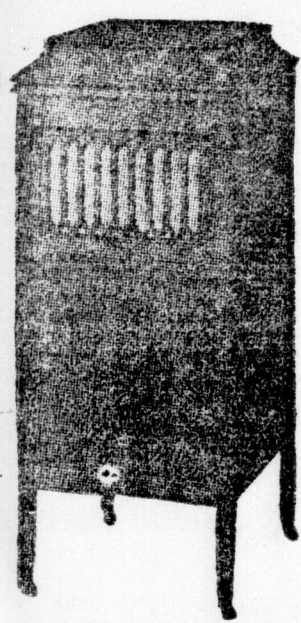

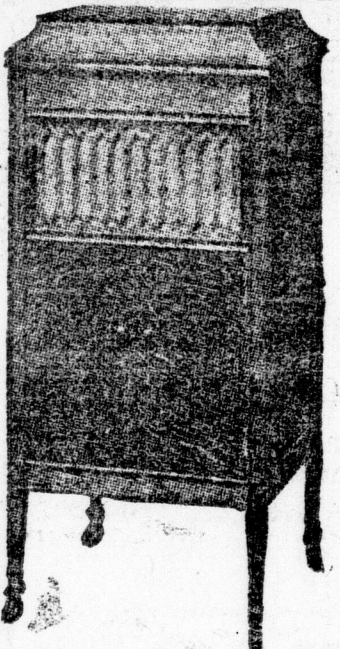
