"Mr. Flock was born at the city of Toronto, on the 6th day of April, 1834, on the site now occupied by the city hall, on Queen street. In that year Toronto was incorporated as a city. Mr. Flock became a resident of London in the year in which it was incorporated as a city, 1855. The late Murray Anderson was then mayor, and Mr. Flock afterwards became his son-in-law.



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
