

PLUMBING BYLAW

Given the First Reading As Amended-Market Boycott is Approved.

Public holiday from 4 o'clock this afternoon for the remainder of the day was declared by the city council last night. The action was taken at the request of the Advertising Club in order that all citizens might be able to witness the Made-in-Canada parade to be held at 5 o'clock.

The plumbing bylaw with amendments recommended by the special committee was given its first reading and sent to No. 2 committee for consideration. Ald. O. I. Cunningham, a member of the plumbing committee, stated that plumbers and citizens who wished to do plumbing work immediately could operate under the bylaw. Which had been effective for the past ten years until the new measure became effective and need take no notice of the present bylaw. The measure when adopted would not be retroactive, he assured them. Mayor Little concurred in this statement, Ald. Cunningham said.


