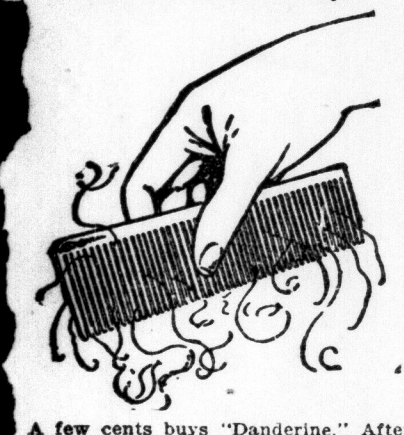

WITH RAPE FOUND****INNOCENT BY JURY**Are Discharged by Justice
Logie—Criminal Docket
For Session Concluded.**CIVIL ACTIONS TODAY**Cases of Alleged Whiskey
Thefts Laid Over To
December Court.Verdicts of "not guilty" were re-
turned by the respective jurors on
two criminal cases heard at the fall
assizes of the supreme court here
Wednesday afternoon and evening. As
a result, Irving Albert, a Muncie In-
dian youth, and Harry Anderson,
colored, of this city, were discharged
by Mr. Justice Logie after standing
trial on charges of rape. This con-
cludes the criminal docket for the
assizes, and civil actions will be held
today.Complainant in the charge against
Irving Albert, who is 14 years of age,
testified that she was picking straw-
berries at an isolated spot near her
home on the afternoon of Sunday,
June 20, when accused came up, at-
tacked her and committed the offence.
Her parents, having evidence regard-
ing her return home, and medical evidence
was also introduced. Barney Logan
and William Finger of Carleton Place
testified that the prisoner was with
them at the time of the alleged crime.
Other witnesses included Cath-
erine Crow, Mrs. Albert (mother of
Albert), and Andrew White and
Washington Dockstader.From Horse Deal.
The defence through A. G. Chis-
holm, endeavored to prove that the
charge emanated from a horse deal
between accused and the alleged vic-
tim's mother, but Justice Logie ruled
it out. The defence challenged twenty
jurymen before a jury was selected.
All the witnesses were Indians, and
the jury was out for an hour."It is an exceedingly filthy case,"
declared A. G. Chisholm in summing
up. "It is unfortunate that it should
have come before the jury. Crown
Attorney J. B. McKillop character-
ized the crime of rape as next in serious-
ness only to murder and urged a con-
viction as a protection to young girls.
Justice Logie, addressing the jury, in-
structed that body give the prisoner
the benefit of the doubt if there was
any involved.The court did not adjourn until 9
a.m., supper being ordered served to
the jurors on duty.
Gladys Owens, complainant in the
charge against Harry Anderson, swore
that he broke into her house in Car-
leton Place on July 30, and committed
the offence charged. Later, when her
husband returned and accosted them,
accused swore at him and knocked
Owens to the floor. He retaliated by
seizing an axe and chasing him to
the door. She was calling for help
regarding the last-mentioned evidence
by her husband. Both admitted that
they knew Anderson years ago in
London.**Denies Charge.**Anderson, on the stand in his own
defence, stated that he worked with
Owens on a horse near the scene of
the alleged crime, and that he lived
alone in a shack near their home. On
the afternoon of July 30 he went to
the Owens house to borrow some
thread to mend his overalls, and that
he did not break in, as charged.Alderman Cameron Wilson has made
an official protest against the action

TOBACCO CROP HAS
BEEN HARVESTED****Recent Hot Spell Hastened
Ripening of Fruit and
Grain.**The following is a summary of the
weekly reports made by agricultural rep-
resentatives to the Ontario department
of agriculture:Districts as far apart as Essex and
Port William report that some grain is
sown in the field and in stock.The unusually warm weather of the
past week has hastened the ripening of
corn, and cutting has been general. Es-
sex states that farmers are offering \$4
an acre for cutting and stacking it.Kent complains that the ground is so
hard that it is difficult for farmers to
plow out their beets.
Buckwheat is reported as turning out
from fair to average in yield and quality.
About 75 per cent of the tobacco crop
has been harvested at the end of the
week under what are described as splen-
did conditions. Kent remarks that good
men for this class of work are hard to
find, notwithstanding that from \$7 to \$8
a day are offered for fit men.There is greater activity in apple
harvest than for some years. More
apples are being sent out in boxes than
formerly. Apple pickers are reported to
be scarce. Norfolk reports that
Greenings are being barreled in large
quantities.The marketing of cattle has been slow,
generally speaking, although selling well
at auction sales. Middlesex, however,
reports that about 600 choice steers were
sold by a local dealer to a Chicago firm
during the week. Dufferin also states
that five cars of cattle were shipped
from Orangeville last Tuesday.Some representatives express the
opinion that too many calves have been
sold for veal this year.The milk flow continues to be very
fair for the time of year, but many
farmers are supplementing pastures with
corn and other feeds. Middlesex states
that some of the local condenseries are
increasing powdering and are making but-
ter.Feeds reports regarding dairy cows:
"Milk cows, springers, are selling at
sales up to \$12, while average cows
freshening, spring brought from
\$7.50 to \$9.00."The Peterboro representative says that
the hog industry is at a low ebb in this
county, as a large number of farmers
have gone out of the business.
Fall wheat sown early is looking re-
markably well, but that put in later
to seed the Hessian fly is not likely to
germinate so well, owing to the dry
condition of the soil at sowing time and
since the average is likely to be
smaller than that of last year.A good deal of fall plowing has been
done. Many tractors are helping out
in this work. Kent reports some farmers
working in the moonlight.
