Four favorites and three second choices, all well backed, cleaned up the card yesterday at Woodbine Park, and the public must have finished a lot ahead of the layers. The weather was threatening, but the rain held off, and the sprinkling, and there was the usual attendance of members and regulars.

The cup was easy for Seismic, the Havoc four-year-old, indulging Cannie Maid in the lead for \$2000.
