HAMILTON WILL SUBMIT CHEAP POWER BYLAW

Slight Opposition to the Measure in City Council—Wm. McNeill Killed by Street Car.

HAMILTON, Nov. 25.—(Special).—With only slight opposition from three members, Aldermen Farrar, Peregrine and Kirkpatrick, the city council this evening decided to submit a bylaw to the people next January asking them to vote \$25,000 for a municipal lighting and power plant, the bylaw expressly providing that the power is to be taken from the hydro-electric power commission.

Another bylaw asking for \$50,000 for new waterworks pumps will also be submitted, in addition to the ward system bylaw. The legislature has petitioned for legislation giving municipalities power to set a standard weight for bread. The waterworks bylaw was passed. A uniform rate for all water meters was set at seven and one-half cents a thousand gallons, the only exception being that supplied to the asylum, and for water meters. The charge for baths was wiped out. The list of deputy returning officers recommended by the finance committee was adopted. It is made up of 39 Conservatives, 29 Liberals and two Independents. R. V. Matthews was appointed chief clerk in the tax collectors' office.

The labor people had a large meeting this evening and decided to apply for a charter for the Ontario labor party. The speakers were William Barry, Walter Rollo and Allan Studholme, M.L.A.

Technical Education. Technical education was the subject of discussion at the meeting of the Canadian Club this evening. The speakers were Inspectors Smith and Ballard, F. P. McPherson, C. R. McCullough, Adam Brown, Dr. R. V. Lytle, S. F. Lazier, K. C. F. J. Howell, J. E. Wodell, G. J. Smith, G. H. Mine, M. Cummings. A resolution was passed approving of the establishment of technical schools and a technical college in Hamilton, and other organizations in the city will be asked to co-operate with the club, and hold a mass meeting on the subject.

The management of the M.C.A. team in the Junior O.R.F.U. series feels sore about the treatment handed out by Parkdale Saturday with reference to finances. Also the gate amounted to \$268, the local team did not get a cent. Another kick is that three Argonauts players were sent to Parkdale team. There will be no protest, however.

The temperance people, also they have a contract for the use of the headliner, do not wish to embroil the theatre management with the hotel people, and an effort will be made to patch matters up so that the hotel people will not be offended.

City Clerk Kent says there is not the slightest doubt that the Cataract Power Company has no civic franchise to do a private lighting business. The company at the Hamilton Electric Light Company have been allowed to carry on this business for twenty-three years, and why the discrepancy that they had no right to do so was not made till now is somewhat of a mystery. Now that the franchise has been made, it is likely efforts will be made to force more favorable rates from the company.


