

RECRUITING LITTLE BETTER YESTERDAY

Fifty-Four Men Passed Medical Test for Overseas Service.

SHAM FIGHT TODAY

Three Thousand Men Take Part in Exercises at High Park.

Recruiting was much better yesterday than for several previous days. Out of 181 men who applied 54 were passed by the doctors and attested.

This brings the infantry battalions at present recruiting in Toronto up to the following strengths: 170th Mississauga... 878, 186th Buffs... 519, 201st Toronto Light Inf... 559, 204th Beavers... 1080, 208th Irish Fusiliers... 840, 215th Bantams... 880.

Four men were obtained yesterday by the 28th Forestry Battalion, which is now being recruited. Toronto is not a lumbering city, so these figures are good, as this battalion is one of lumbermen, mill hands, drivers and tractors.

The Army Supply Dept require the services of 20 men, issuers and loaders, immediately for duty at Niagara camp. An unlimited number of chauffeurs and transport drivers to go overseas in the near future.

The 8th Mississauga Horse will go to Oakville on Saturday morning at 9 o'clock and camp at the farm of Col. A. C. Cox, returning Sunday night. The Canadian Mounted Rifles, the only cavalry unit that is recruiting men for overseas service.

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About three thousand men will take part in the exercises, which are intended for training in outpost duty both in attack and defence.

The record office has been moved from the camp at Niagara. Lieut. J. F. W. Wake has been attached to Col. Weyer's staff at the Exhibition as camp adjutant.

Capt. R. B. S. Burton has been transferred to the casualty office at 215 Simcoe street.

All arrangements have been completed for the battalion parade and picnic down the Kingston road of the 204th Beaver Battalion. This will be a send-off to the men of the unit before they go into summer camp.

A medical inspection of all ranks of the 14th Battalion will be held in the dairy building at the Exhibition camp commencing at 8.30 today.

Recruits of a very high class continue to come to the Army Medical Corps. Among those who have recently enlisted are Dr. Thomas E. Stalon, previously a consulting physician at Guy's Hospital, London.

In addition to enlisting himself, he has given four sons to the colors, the eldest of whom was recently killed in action. Lieut. C. Richardson is trying to build up a fine complement of officers and men for the new base hospital at East Garrison street.

Nurses, clerks and male nurses are required immediately. The 17th Battalion has a busy program for the last week in preparation for moving to Camp Borden.

Ninety men were in a vaccination parade yesterday morning. Col. Reed's battalion is quartered in Jesse Ketchum school and has had ample opportunity in the northern section of the city for practicing field movements.

LATE GEN. MERCER EVERY INCH SOLDIER

Early in Life Manifested His Interest in Military Affairs.

EFFICIENCY ADVOCATE

Foreseen War Years Ago and Urged Preparation in Canada.

Major-Gen. Malcolm Smith Mercer, C.B., commander of the 8th Division Canadian Overseas Contingent, was of U. E. L. descent and was born in Eloblocks Township.

He removed with his family at an early age to the home near Tillsonburg, where he spent his early years.

He entered the St. Catharines Collegiate Institute. He matriculated from there and went on to the Toronto University, from which he graduated in 1887.

While at Varsity he was actively identified with the Literary Society and the Glee Club.

He decided to take up the study of law, and upon the completion of his course at the University of Toronto, he was called to the bar.

He continued the practice of his profession for 25 years until war was declared and he volunteered for active service abroad.

Gen. Mercer early manifested an interest in military affairs by joining the "K" company (University Company Q.O.R.) and by taking a successful course in military training in the United States.

He was for several years chief executive officer of the matches of the Ontario Rifle Association, and was a member of the Military Council of the Dominion Rifle Association at Ottawa.

Military Tactics Student. The late general was an ardent and enthusiastic student of military tactics and a few years ago he took the advanced course in military tactics prescribed for staff officers.

On the outbreak of the war he was ready for service. He left Toronto with the 1st Canadian overseas contingent as commander of the Q.O.R. when it left for Valenciennes, and while there he was given command of the 1st Infantry Brigade.

Gen. Mercer was a man of varied tastes. He was an ardent lover of nature and had also an admiration for pictures, having a very notable collection of the works of one of our most enthusiastic painters of landscape, Carl Ahrens.

He enjoyed a game of checkers or billiards and was at the height of his skill in getting on horseback. He was a keen sportsman and a few weeks in the "open." Gen. Mercer was unmarried in religion a Presbyterian and was also a zealous Mason.

In the present war he distinguished himself and was rated by military experts as one of the ablest soldiers in the Canadian ranks.

In recognition of his conduct of the campaign of last year at St. Julian and Langemarck he was made a Companion of the Bath in June, 1915.
